DIVIDE A DOUBLE HEADER WITH THE HANNIBAL MULES

Marks, With Help of Hitting by Mates, Huris Locals to Victory in Opener, 10 to 3.

BECK TOSSES AWAY HIS GAME

Misplays in Ninth Enable Mules to Count Two Without a Hit and Visitors Take Second, 5 to 3.

The first double-header in the Rock Island yard this season was a 50-50 affair. Marks, assisted by hard hitting on the part of his mates, won the initial tilt for Rock Island, 10 to 3, but Beck threw away the second game to the Mules, the count being 5 to 3, with the Islanders on the short end. Two thousand fans sat patiently while the teams performed for over four hours.

In the first fuss the local sluggers found "Gentleman" Keller's slants to their liking, garnering 15 hits, which came at opportune moments when bingles meant runs. On the other hand, Marks held the Mules to nine swats, resulting in three runs in the fifth and sixth, his only bad innings. The Islanders wasted no time. Erlwein, who has been going like a fiend both at the bat and in the field for the past two days, singled to center with one down, and Biltz followed with a safe one in the same spot. The two then manipulated a double steal and scored on Clayton's hit to center.

In the third Erlwein walked with one down. Biltz was safe on Keller's error and the pair pulled another double steal. Clayton skied to Bossoloni, "Chubby" Stocker doubled down the first base line, counting Erlwein and Biltz. In the fourth Cerny led off with a hit to center. Munch died on an infield roller, but Marks singled to left and Cerny scored from second. Wolfe scratched a single through second base and Erlwein lammed a triple to the flagpole, counting Wolfe and Marks.

The Mules saw the home plate for the first time in the fifth game. Krueger was safe on Erlwein's bobble and he counted on Seiffert's double. In the sixth Hannibal added two more. Bossoloni doubled to left with one down. Nye hit a two-bagger in the same spot, scoring him, and Nye counted when Munch let a third strike on Krueger get by him. In the seventh Erlwein started the fun with a double. Biltz responded with a single, scoring Fritzie, and Heine scored on Clayton's hit. In the eighth Munch singled, took second on Krueger's error, and was sacrificed to third by Wolfe, scoring on Biltz's infield out.

Misplays Lose Second Tilt.

The second game differed from the first in that hits were fewer. A wild heave past third by Beck, which resulted in two runs, won for the Mules. Although George held the visitors to five hits he was wild, passing five, and his walks were costly. In the first inning Nicholson walked, stole second, took third on Beatty's out and scored when Kaylor was put out and Erlwein to Lister. The Islanders came back with two runs. Erlwein walked with one down and scored on Nye's error. Biltz singled and was caught at second on Clayton's tap. Stocker walked and Zetse counted on Lister's hit to center. In the second Nye walked and scored on Krueger's first double. In the third Waring was safe when Erlwein juggled his grounder. Nye hit to Cerny, who pitched Waring at second. Nye then stole second and scored on Krueger's second double.

The Islanders knotted the count in the seventh, when Wolfe singled and scored on Erlwein's triple. Fritzie was retired trying to take home on the hit.


In the fatal ninth Beck got himself in bad by walking Nye, the first man up. Krueger bunted a roller down the first base line and Lister fielded it cleanly and tossed it to Erlwein. It ought to have been an easy out, but Fritzie dropped the ball. Seiffert bunted toward first. Beck snatched up the ball and tagged Seiffert out. In trying to double Nye at third he threw past Stocker, and both Nye and Krueger scored. Two runs without a hit. Scores of the two games follow:

DAVENPORT WINS EASILY ON TRACK

Iowans Collect 92½ Points, While Rock Island Trails Third With 20½ in Dual Meet.

A tri-city track and field meet that broke two tri-city records, equalled one and imperiled several others, was held at Exposition park Saturday afternoon and resulted in a victory for Davenport by the score of 92½ points, Moline ranking second with 22 and Rock Island third with 20½. The most sensational record-breaker was the half mile, in which Milton of Moline and Thomas of Rock Island tied in a neck and neck race lasting two minutes and four seconds, superseding the record set by Earl Chalk of Rock Island by three and four-fifths seconds. The other record was broken by Dockterman in the 440-yard dash, his time being 52 4-5 seconds as compared with 54 4-5 made by Kipp of Rock Island in 1914. Dockterman likewise equalled the record of 23 seconds set for the 220-yard dash by Tomson of Davenport in 1914. The mile relay was an easy victory for the locals at the pace of three minutes, 53 4-5 seconds.

Three of these were two-baggers, but an overflow crowd was mainly responsible for the extra base tacked onto each.
