

## GET BOATS READY FOR BUSY SEASON

Steamer Morning Star Will Take Big Cruise Down to Florence, Alabama, May 29.

### VISIT THE SHILOH BATTLEFIELD

Trip to Take Two Weeks and Will Be Real Treat—Chances for Helen Blair Schedule.

These are busy days in the local harbor, where a large gang of men is busy getting the steamers Helen Blair and Morning Star ready for service. All carpenter work was finished up a week ago. The engine crew are getting engines and boilers in shape, while the mates, with their crews and stewards are cleaning and painting, doing a thorough job of housecleaning. Captain Blair, General Agent Lamont and their help in the office at No. 1 Brady street, Davenport, are busy as bees in June, sending out bundles of literature and completing arrangements for the campaign soon to begin in earnest.

The campaign for 1916 includes a radical change in the program for the steamer Helen Blair. The steamer Black Hawk, which has been running on the Blair's old schedule in the Davenport-Burlington trade, will be kept in the same run all season, with Captain Dodds in charge and A. H.

(Bert) Lovette, pilot. She leaves here every Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 4 p. m. for Burlington, when she connects with the steamer Keokuk for Fort Madison, Keokuk and Quincy.

Beginning on May 30 the steamer Helen Blair will leave every Tuesday at 3:30 p. m. for Quincy and all intermediate points, returning to Davenport at 11 p. m. Friday and she will leave Davenport every Saturday at 4 p. m. for Muscatine, Burlington and all intermediate points to Keokuk, returning home Monday at 11 p. m.

An orchestra has been engaged for the Helen Blair which will provide music for dancing and all entertainments.

### Same Crew for Star.

The Morning Star will come out in charge of the same crew she had last season, captain W. A. Blair; pilots, Cyrrian Buisson and W. L. Hunter; purser, William Keith; engineers, George A. Galloway and Isaac Burns and Ferd Bynum, steward.

Her first trip will be a short one, taking out the Davenport high school on Saturday p. m., May 27, and that evening she will make a special trip to the great Keokuk dam, returning early Monday morning.

On that afternoon, May 29, she will leave on her big trip down the Mississippi to Cairo, then up the Ohio to Paducah and then 200 miles up the Tennessee river to Florence, Ala., spending half a day or more at Pittsburg Landing, Tenn., to visit the "Battlefield of Shiloh" and the National cemetery there. This will be a two weeks' trip. The Morning Star made this trip in 1914 and several of her passengers who made the trip then are going again and made their reservations early.

The people of Florence gave the Morning Star glad welcome and entertained her passengers royally on her former trip and will be glad to do so again.

In 1914 the Morning Star landed at Savannah, Tenn., and her people spent a pleasant hour in the elegant large southern home of Edgar Cherry. This home was the headquarters of General Grant before and during the battle of Shiloh. Mr. Cherry showed with great pride a fine, large portrait of General Grant that he had just hung and which was admired very greatly.

## BURLINGTON MEN ARE GIVEN RAISE

Ten Per Cent Increase in Wages Received by All Shop Employees on the System.

### MAY TAKE IN OTHER BRANCHES

Announcement of the Good News is Made at Aurora By the Superintendent of Motive Power.

Aurora, Ill., May 10.—Joseph W. Cyr, superintendent of motive power of the Burlington railroad, today announced officially that the company has granted a 10 per cent increase in wages to all shopmen on the system to take effect from May 1, last.

At the offices of the local shops as late as this afternoon, officials said, that no notice of the increase has been received from Chicago, but there was general rejoicing throughout the shops when it became known that word of the raise had come from headquarters.

"I do not know where the information came from but the story which was printed in the Sunday Beacon-News was correct," Mr. Cyr said over the long distance telephone this afternoon. "As it was covered completely in the Sunday's issue I do not see that there is anything more to say about it. The increase went into effect May 1."

The wage increase, Mr. Cyr said, will affect only shop employees. In Aurora 1,600 men find the increase in their envelopes next pay day. The increase in the pay roll in the shops here alone will amount to approximately \$11,500 a month.

It has been reported from a reliable source that an increase is to be granted employees in other departments of the railroad. Enginemen, trainmen and yard employees are negotiating with the railroad companies for an eight-hour day and until this question is settled it is not probable that there will be any change in the wage scale, local railroad officials said today.

### May Reorganize Rock Island.

Chicago, May 10.—Rock Island issues attracted an extraordinary degree of attention in New York yesterday. The stock advanced from 18 1/2 to a high of 22 1/2. The close was at 21 1/4. About 75,000 shares changed hands. The refunding 4 per cent bonds were in good demand and advanced about a point, to 74 1/2. The debenture 5s were up from 49 1/4 to 52.

The basis for the rise lay in rumors in New York that an understanding had been reached between New York bankers and the Amster stockholders' committee by which a scheme for reorganizing and financing the property would be promoted. According to the rumor the refunding 4s are to be replaced by a larger issue and the debenture 5s left as they are or exchanged for preferred stock. It was said this plan would furnish the company with about \$25,000 cash for working capital and physical improvement.

It was held that the earnings of the property are such that the parties in interest should be able to get together and formulate a plan without causing any sacrifice by the stockholders.

It has been observed for some months that Mr. Amster's continued assertions that the stockholders should not be asked to give up anything are gaining in strength, and the general market has come to believe in the soundness of the earning power of the company.


