

MAN IS SLUGGED COIN DISAPPEARS

John Falkner Steps From Fifth Avenue Saloon and is Felled With Blow; Becomes Unconscious.

HARRY DUNBAR ADMITS ASSAULT

Tells Police Following His Arrest That He Beat Up Victim, But He Did Not Steal Any Money.

When John Falkner, 2502 Fourth avenue, stepped out a saloon at 2610 Fifth avenue at closing time Saturday night, he was felled with a blow on the head. When he regained consciousness he discovered that he had been robbed of \$60.

With his clothes covered with blood, and displaying a black eye, he rushed to the police station. Patrolmen were placed on the case, although not until yesterday was an arrest made. Patrolman McCarthy nabbed Harry Dunbar, who lives on Fourth avenue near Twenty-sixth street. Falkner told the police he believed that Dunbar assaulted and robbed him.

Falkner spent the evening in the saloon with four other men, one of whom was Dunbar. Conversation drifted to fights the men had been engaged in at various times in their lives, and when the bartender announced closing time Dunbar left the saloon.

Falkner followed him a few moments later and he just stepped out onto the sidewalk when he was slugged. Dunbar, following his arrest, told the police that Falkner had been acting gay all night and had claimed that he would trim him. Dunbar admitted assaulting Falkner, police said, but denied he had robbed him, saying Falkner was either lying about the money he had, lost it, or that some other person went through his clothes.

Case Continued a Day.

Dunbar gave a cash bond today when arraigned in police court. He is accused of assault and battery. The preliminary hearing will be held tomorrow morning.

Better Than Horses.

These mules proved more hardy than horses in the hard bandit chases. They were better able to live off the country without loss of strength. They ate almost everything except rocks and one kind of rope. The one rope which they could not eat was a Mexican latat, made out of horse hair.

While the animal did not actually take much leather or other foreign substance into their stomachs, they were continually chewing at harness when it was within reach, to get the slightly salty taste it possesses. The mules also nibbled at trees, dead weeds, sticks and dirt. On the mountain marches they thrived fairly well, while carrying heavy loads of food and ammunition behind the cavalry columns.

New Raids Planned.

San Antonio, Texas, May 15.—Information indicating a plan for the resumption of raids across the international line near Brownsville, Texas, has reached army headquarters here and will, it is expected, cause a considerable strengthening of the force now patrolling that district. and Brownsville, the district so frequently raided a year ago.

Official reports from the commanding officer gave no additional news of the activities of armed Mexicans opposite Progresso, Texas, but their presence there was in line with reports made by both agents of the department of justice and the agents of the state department.

No apparent anxiety regarding the position of the little force that entered Mexico near Boquillas was indicated at headquarters. Colonel Sibley is commanding only four troops of cavalry and a machine gun company, but army men here believe that he would have no difficulty in withdrawing if menaced by a superior force.

Expedition Halted.

Marathon, Texas, May 15.—The expedition in search of the bandits who committed the Glenn Springs outrage, has checked its dash into Mexico and is now awaiting reinforcements before pushing on, according to reports received here today. A message has been sent to General Funston by Colonel Sibley, commanding the 14th cavalry, it was learned here, asking for aid.

Military observers here point out that Major Langhorne and his flying squadron of the 8th cavalry are now perhaps 200 miles beyond their base without sufficient troops to protect their line of communication. Marathon, the base, is 90 miles distant from Boquillas over broken country. Several instances have been reported the past few days of bandits cutting in behind the expedition without meeting armed resistance.

Supplies of every character are now being rushed from Marathon to Boquillas, there to be transferred to pack animals for Sibley's expedition. Mexican teamsters are engaged in this work under Captain John S. Chambers of the quartermaster's department. He reports the Mexicans faithful to their trust. No supplies have failed to reach their destination. The two Mexican prisoners brought into Marathon by Sheriff Shoemaker from Boquillas last Saturday night will be sent to Alpine for trial for murder.

PLANS COMPLETE FOR BOOSTER DAY

Eighteen Hundred Block Merchants Have Finished Arrangements for Dollar Sales Wednesday.

Final arrangements for the big booster event of the 1800 block on Wednesday have been completed by the merchants' association, promising to surpass all previous efforts of the organization for trade promotion.

Past performances of the 1800 Block Business Men's association in trade promotion have been complete successes. With a record for booster activities such as is planned for Wednesday, everything indicates that another achievement will be added to the list.
