BLOOD CLOT WAS CAUSE OF DEATH

Pete George's Demise Was Not the Result of Foul Play as Had Been Suspected by Authorities.

PUSHED ARM THROUGH WINDOW

Greek In Attempting to Demonstrate His Strength Cuts Member on Jagged Glass—Inquest Held.

An inquest held yesterday afternoon disposed of a supposition that Pete George had met death through foul play. The inquiry into the death of the unfortunate man by the coroner's jury developed the fact that a clot of blood which formed in his heart after his arm had been cut by pushing it through a window glass caused his death. In the opinion of Dr. H. S. Bennett, attending physician, the blood lost was not in itself sufficient to cause death and a clot of blood which formed was evidently the reason for his demise.

Notify Relatives.

Testimony of companions, taken at the inquest, was that the fatal accident occurred in the rear part of the building. George, it was said, returned home late at night. In an attempt to show his strength to a number of companions he struck at the frame of the window with all his might, missed the framework, his hand hit the glass and a ragged cut on the arm resulted.

Medical help was summoned at once and the man was taken to the hospital. He was accompanied by one of his companions.

George was 35 years old. Body is being held in the Rose & Barnard morgue till word from relatives is received.

MOLINE OBITUARY

Christopher Hackett.

Christopher Hackett, Fourth avenue and Thirteenth street, died at 12:30 yesterday afternoon after an illness extending over a year with cancer of the stomach.

He was born in Ireland 75 years ago and came to America 35 years ago. After living five years in New York Mr. Hackett came to Moline where he lived for 30 years preceding his death. He was employed as flagman by the Rock Island road at the Eleventh street crossing for several years.

Funeral services will be held in the Danielson & Furgie chapel at 7:30 tomorrow morning and in St. Mary's church at 8. Rev. J. S. Kelly will officiate and interment will be in Calvary cemetery, Rock Island.

Mrs. Karna Pearson.


