

DIXON MAN GETS PARTY'S BACKING

Wm. B. Brinton Endorsed as Candidate for Governor on Democratic Ticket.

Chicago, Sept. 9.—The Cook county democratic committee at a special meeting today endorsed William B. Brinton of Dixon, Ill., candidate for the democratic nomination for governor, by a vote of 25 to 7. Those who voted against the endorsement were committeemen formerly allied with the faction led by former Mayor Carter H. Harrison.

Roger C. Sullivan attended the meeting. The action taken will result in Brinton receiving the solid support of the regular democratic organization at the primary election Sept. 13. Friends of Governor Edward F. Dunne expressed surprise, as it was believed no candidate would be endorsed.

Brinton later said he was confident he would carry 90 of the 102 counties in the state and be nominated over Governor Dunne by a large plurality.

CONTINUE CASE OF POMROY ASSAILANT

On the request of the prosecution the hearing of James Poulas, who made the attack on the life of Dr. W. B. Pomroy of Davenport at the Rock Island Southern station on the afternoon of Aug. 23, has been continued 10 days. REV. SHAW AT SOUTH PARK CHURCH SUNDAY

Fruit Prices Low.

It is estimated that at least half of the housewives in the country have turned up their minds to can no fruit this season on account of the higher price of sugar. This decision has been reached in a haphazard way, without much logic or good sense behind it.

Most women use a maximum of a quarter to a third of a pound of sugar in each quart jar of canned fruit. Now sugar is about two cents a pound above normal, and, assuming that a third of a pound is used in each quart jar, the additional cost for canning, brought about by the higher price of sugar, is, at most, only one-half cent per quart jar.

Few women analyze these figures. They merely say, "15 pounds of sugar for a dollar? I can't afford to put up fruit at such prices," and lose sight of the fact that canners must pay more for their sugar, and war prices for their tin, consequently must sell their products at higher prices than formerly.

Therefore in time of plenty the housewife should prepare for the winter and "put up" her supply now while the prices of peaches and pears is low and quality so good. Arrange with your dealer for your supply at once. (Adv.)

CONTRACTS AWARDED ON PAVING AND MAINS

The city commission today awarded to P. F. Trenkenschuh the contract for constructing a watermain on Fourth and Fifteenth streets and on Twenty-first and Twenty-third avenues. Mr. Trenkenschuh was the only one that entered a bid for the work. The Tri-City Construction company was given the contract for paving Twenty-third street between Second and Fourth avenues and Second avenue between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets. On the latter the curbing will be reset.

On the paving of Railroad avenue between Forty-fifth and Forty-sixth streets, Forty-fifth street from Railroad avenue to Tenth avenue and on Tenth avenue from Forty-fifth to Forty-fourth streets bids were opened today. The Concrete Construction company of Moline was the lowest bidder. The bids were referred to the board of local improvements and the contract will be awarded at some later date.

The feature of the speaking program is to be an address by "Jim" Larkin, the Irish revolutionist, and only surviving signer of the Irish declaration of independence.
