## CONTEST WINNERS TO BE ANNOUNCED

Prizes in East Moline City Beautiful Contest Will Be Awarded Friday Evening at Lyric.

## VIEWS OF YARDS TO BE SHOWN

Statement Will Be Made During Evening Regarding Visiting Nurse—Invitations Distributed.

During the summer months residents of East Moline have been trying to outdo each other in beautifying the surroundings of their homes. This was accomplished by the offering of a set of prizes last spring, by the Woman's club and extension committee, for the best improvements made in home surroundings during the five months of the spring and summer and also a set of prizes for the girls that had the best flower gardens. There was also a set of prizes for the best vegetable gardens for the boys. In all 431 people entered the different contests.

Friday evening of this week \$175 will be given out to the winners in the city beautiful and flower garden contests. These prizes will be given out at the Lyric theater on Seventh street, the managers of that motion picture house having offered the use of their house for the occasion. Each one who entered in any of the contests has been sent an invitation to be present Friday evening. The invitation is a ticket of admission not only for the individual receiving it but for all members of the immediate family.

The theater will open at 6:30. The seats will be reserved for those who hold invitations until 7:30, after which any vacant seats will be thrown open to anyone who wishes to attend.

**Pictures to Be Shown.**  
For the first hour, from 6:50 to 7:30, motion pictures will be shown. Stereopticon pictures of a number of the yards of East Moline will be flashed. These stereopticon slides have been made from photographs taken last spring and again this fall, after the yards had been beautified. Not all of the prize winning yards have been put on slides, but many of them have been. Then there are slides of factories, business places and of the new high school building.

That there will be some surprises when the prizes are given out goes without saying. During course of the evening a public announcement will be made regarding the visiting nurse question, which the people of that city have been working for some time.

With the doubles nearing an end, the singles will be taken up in earnest and finals should be reached by the middle of next week. Several matches have already been played and the first round is practically cleaned up. There are a large number of entries, however, and because they come from all four cities it is harder to play off matches as fast as in an ordinary local tournament, because of the difficulties involved in finding a time convenient for both contestants to come from another city to play on the local courts. 
