### TWO REVEAL SCHEME FOR GETTING RICH

now appears to have been of international proportions, were not confined to the blackmail of wealthy men and women, according to information developed today. Among the effects in the office of David Edward Donahue, one of the men caught in the Saturday

night raid on the fashionable south-side apartment house, was stationery of the "United Turf Exchange," with headquarters in New York and offices all over the world. There were also ciphers for deciphering messages received by wire, telling what horses to bet on, how much to bet, what races and ponies to play.

Fake newspaper clippings detailed the wonderful cleanups made by a young eastern plunger in pool rooms apparently had been used to lure victims.

According to department of justice officials today, here are some of the things done by the syndicate:

They fleeced a multimillionaire of New York out of \$40,000 by threatening him with arrest for alleged violations of the Mann act, two of the members of the syndicate impersonating secret service agents for that purpose.

They frightened a wealthy Philadelphia woman who had been friendly with a stranger into giving them \$35,000.

They took \$10,000 from each of five Chicagoans, two of whom are women.

They brought about their own arrest by allegedly taking \$3,500 from Mrs. Regina Clipper of Philadelphia and afterward kidnapping her.

It was said today that the organization had worked for a whole year since the first of the year, and it is believed to have cleaned up in that time \$1,000,000. The government officials say that for one known victim of the syndicate there are probably 20 unknown.

The eight members of the syndicate so far, were still in New Jersey, awaiting their preliminary hearing before the United States commissioner tomorrow.

### Mrs. Clipper Will Testify.

Philadelphia, Sept. 18.—An agent of the department of justice will leave here tonight for Chicago to appear against members of an alleged blackmailing syndicate arrested in that city Saturday night. With him will go Mrs. Regina Clipper, formerly of this city, but now residing in New Jersey, who is expected to appear against some of those under arrest.

Mrs. Clipper was a victim of the alleged blackmailing syndicate according to the federal authorities, having paid over to the syndicate a sum of money said to be less than \$1,000. Some of the alleged blackmailers were arrested and when Mrs. Clipper was about to appear against them she succeeded in getting her into Canada.

W. G. Butler, an alleged member of the syndicate, who was arrested here on June 13 charged with attempting to extort money from a Philadelphia woman to protect her son, was to have been tried at the present term of the federal court here, but as the woman has since died the case has been held up indefinitely. Butler was arrested the day after an alleged confederate was apprehended in New York.

One letter found in Donahue's room at the apartment house was from the "Horseman's Association" of 1488 Market street, Louisville, Ky., signed by J. C. Saulsbury, secretary, and addressed to A. T. Karger. "The secretary said he was sorry to hear of Mr. Karger's notorious late arrest and he wouldn't have another occurrence like that again."

It seemed that "Mr. Karger's" picture had appeared in a newspaper in connection with book making activities at the races.

According to department of justice officials here today, the "United Turf Exchange" must have been an exclusive affair. The rules stated that members using the club rooms in the evening must appear in full dress.

Evidently the "horseman's association" was known in Louisville as a "brain brokerage house. Code books showed how wagers on horse races could be placed, and there was apparently no limit.

Louisville, Sept. 18.—City directories of recent years do not carry the name of "J. C. Saulsbury," and extended inquiry today among horsemen in Louisville failed to reveal either his identity or locate a "horseman's association."

The number given, 1488 Market street, does not exist. House numbers in the fourteen hundred block on that street stop at 1432.

At Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 18.—Department of justice officials here today said they had received no information concerning a telegram sent from here to Helen Evers, one of the alleged members of a so-called "blackmail syndicate" under arrest in Chicago, in which she was warned to watch the "fire escape." Federal authorities in Chicago had asserted the sender was being sought in Los Angeles.

E. M. Blanford, special agent of the department here, said he had no official knowledge of the case.

### Increase Iowa Coal Rates.

Des Moines, Iowa, Sept. 18.—Retail rates for eastern coal are to be advanced some time this week in Des Moines and throughout Iowa, according to a statement today by local retail fuel dealers. A car shortage is given as a reason for the advance. Rates for Iowa coal also will be slightly increased for the same reason it was said.

114 Are Given Work.
