

ARRANGE RALLY FOR WOMEN OF QUAD-CITIES

Expect 5,000 Girls in Industry to Attend Meeting Planned For Next Tuesday.

Mrs. William Asher, director of women's work in connection with the Billy Sunday meetings, at the conclusion of the services yesterday afternoon, met the quad cities' business women's invitation com-

mittee to make definite plans for the big rally for business women of the quad cities, which is to be held at the tabernacle on the evening of Tuesday, Sept. 23. At this time it is expected that approximately 5,000 business women will participate in the events planned for that occasion. They will occupy a reserved section of the tabernacle and girls representing each business house will be identified by some special badge, as a ribbon, a flower, etc. Tomorrow evening at Broadway Presbyterian church there will be held a meeting of the council women, luncheon to be served at the conclusion of work. Through the efforts of the quad cities' business women's invitation committee there has been selected a council head for every ten girls in business, this council head to be under the general direction of the large com-

mittee of women and she in turn to be in a way responsible for the close contact of each girl under her in the general spirit of the Sunday meetings. At the meeting and luncheon tomorrow evening plans will be definitely settled for the big rally next Tuesday evening. Badges of identification will be determined upon and any other matter that will need attention will be taken up. Invitations are being sent out by the general committee under the direction of Mrs. C. W. Hawes in Rock Island, Mrs. J. H. Miller of Davenport, Mrs. Babcock of Moline and Miss Gibson of East Moline. Mrs. Asher will be at the Thursday night luncheon and will take this opportunity to become acquainted with the council girls, and will address them briefly. Plan Noon Day Meetings. Noonday meetings among the

business women of the various cities will be arranged, the Rock Island meetings to be held at the Y. W. C. A., when a special luncheon will be served in the association gymnasium. Just what day will be assigned to each city has not been determined. However, the day decided upon will hold throughout the series of Sunday meetings. According to present plans the services will be held continuously from 11:30 to 1:30, and girls are privileged to come and go whenever they care to. Music, short talks, prayer, etc., will feature every noon day meeting. Tickets will be issued for the Tuesday evening seat reservation in the tabernacle, and they may be procured from the council girls, who in turn secure them from the general committee of women.

NEW MANAGER FOR ILLINOIS THEATRE HERE

G. C. Edwards of Chicago Replaces R. Clay Crawford, Reported Injured in Plane Crash.

C. L. Carrell, the Chicago theatrical booking agent, owning controlling interest in the Illinois theatre, has placed G. C. Edwards of Chicago at the head of the management of the house. R. Clay Crawford, the former manager, has dis-

posed of his share in the stock. Mr. Edwards took charge of the house Saturday, following the trip of Mr. Crawford to Chicago, where he is reported to have been injured in an airplane accident. The new manager will book feature pictures, Carrell Hippodrome vaudeville and big road shows. Miss Marie Bodon of East Moline will continue as treasurer. The new manager is a capable man for the place, having had years of experience in the theatrical profession, both appearing personally in vaudeville, as an orchestra musician and having to do with the business end of various similar enterprises. It is very probable that he will make the house a success, carrying out the work former Manager Crawford started. No later news has come concern-

ing the reported accident to Crawford Saturday and it is not known where he is at present. His interests in the Colonial and other theatres of Rock Island have not been disposed of, so far as can be learned. In the Day's News

Rev. Dr. William T. Manning, whose name was presented to the special convention of the Episcopal diocese of New York when it met today to choose a successor to the late Bishop David H. Greer, is rector of Trinity church in the metropolis. During the war he took active part in relief work and was especially prominent in protesting against the deportation of Belgians. Dr. Manning is a southerner, whose first parish was in Redlands, Cal. Then he was called to be professor of dogmatic theology in the University of the south. Later he had parishes in Pennsylvania and Nashville and in 1903 he was called to New York city to take charge of one of the chapels of Trinity parish. In 1907 he succeeded the Rev. Dr. Mozza Dix as rector of Trinity. He represents the high, but not the extremely high section of the Protestant Episcopal church in what is said to be the wealthiest diocese of that body in the United States. It is just 40 years since the first woman—Mrs. Belya Lockwood—was admitted to practice before the supreme court of the United States.
