

ARSENAL COAL WILL LAST FOR THREE MONTHS

Fire College on Island Still Indefinite, Waiting Time When the Cities Can Send Men.

Through its reserve of 12,000 tons of coal constantly kept on hand, the Rock Island arsenal is protected for three months against any fuel famine which may follow the strike of miners. The big plant is daily receiving enough coal to keep all consuming sections going. In addition there are 12,000 tons stored on the island. This will provide enough fuel to run the plant for three months.

There seems no chance at present that the plan of intercommunication by a system of alarms between the tri-city and arsenal fire departments proposed some time ago, will be carried out very soon. The plan is linked with one proposing that firemen of the Rock Island, Davenport and Moline organizations be sent in pairs to the island to study the most advanced methods of fire fighting. Davenport and Rock Island have signified that for some time to come they will be unable to spare even one man, and Moline has the question still under consideration.

A. needs no introduction to this community," said Lieutenant Colonel J. H. Read, acting commandant of the post, yesterday afternoon. Fare Raises Nov. 1.
The new fare of \$2.50 instead of \$2 per book of tickets for arsenal workmen riding on the cars of the Tri-City Railway company, goes into effect Nov. 1, following an action favorable to the increase made last week by the war department.

Colonel Harry B. Jordan, commandant of the Rock Island arsenal, left yesterday morning for Washington to attend a conference with Major General C. C. Williams, chief of ordnance.

Regarding the situation at the post in regard to amount of work and volume of orders, Lieutenant Colonel Read said: "The arsenal continues to receive various and sundry orders from outside for manufacturing.

There is no diminution in work in the shops. Men of the skilled trades and a number of lab.ers can easily obtain positions here as well as at the Savanna proving ground."

CAMPAIGN FUND FOR SALVATION ARMY BUILDING

Local Organization to Use Large Share of County's Contribution for Headquarters.

A large part of the funds which will be raised in the coming campaign of the Salvation Army, if expectations are fulfilled, will be used to purchase a lot and erect a building in Rock Island. The quota assigned to Rock Island county, with the exception of Moline, East Moline and Silvis, which conducted a separate campaign, is \$25,000. Of this amount \$22,000 will be used for the real estate purchase and building purposes, the remaining \$3,000 going to support the local army corps, pay current expenses for the year and carry on local charitable activities.

BOARD RUSHING WORK TO WIDEN MOLINE STREETS

(Special Moline Service).

Preliminary action necessary towards widening the thoroughfare of three downtown streets in Moline will be taken this winter. The project probably will be ready for pick and shovel next spring. That is the opinion of Mayor C. P. Skinner. The project was recommended to the board of local improvements last week by the council. Mayor Skinner is chairman of the board.

The council resolution recommended that Thirteenth, Fourteenth and Sixteenth streets be widened between Fourth and Seventh avenues. The widening will involve considerable expenditure. The board is now considering making the thoroughfare of each street eight feet wider. The extra width will be obtained by cutting four feet from the boulevard on each street.
