The Safety and Tax Exemption of Joint Stock Land Bank 5% Bonds

The Federal District Court at Kansas City on Oct. 21, 1919, dismissed the suit attacking the constitutionality of the Federal Farm Loan Act and the Tax Exemption of the bonds, thus in effect establishing the validity of the Act and all of its provisions. An appeal from this decision has been taken to the supreme court which has been asked by all parties to advance the case for early hearing.
