

EDWARDS RIVER WANT TO STOP GIVING POWER

Company Will Be Served by North
Western Union, Answer to Brundage
Sue Dismissed.

Announcement that the Edwards River Power company is to cease operations within 60 days, giving place to a system of electric power to be furnished by the Northern Illinois Power company, was first made by the answer filed today to the suit recently brought against that company by Attorney General Brundage of Illinois.

Sued by the state was started to compel the Edwards River Power company to furnish electricity for lighting and commercial purposes for several coal mines and six villages about Matherville, where the power is located. At several times the company has ceased for appreciable periods to furnish this power.

M. A. Walsh, active representative of the company and defendant, through Attorney C. J. Searle, came back with a demurrer, which was overruled by Judge W. T. Church in the circuit court here last week. Today, the last allowed, the company to make answer to the original bill, brought forth the company's answer.

Denies It Discontinued.
Mr. Walsh attempts to show, in his answer, that the company has been struggling to generate and send to the customers the power called for in their various contracts. He denies that the Edwards River Power company, which, he asserts, leases the Matherville plant from the owners of the Rock Island Southern railroad, has at any time staged a definite shut-down of its plant.

He admits that its service has been curtailed at several times. However, the answer states, there have been enforced periods of failure to give service. These are alleged to be resultant from unavoidable circumstances. The Southern discontinued operation and no coal could be obtained to operate the Matherville plant. At another time machinery broke down. In fact several instances of this condition are indicated.

The gist of the answer lies in the claim Mr. Walsh makes that the main allegation against the company—deliberately discontinuing service—is untrue or misstated. He claims that increasing service on account of physical inability to generate or send out power the com-

COUNCIL WILL DIRECT CHURCH SURVEY PLANS

Religious Workers to Conduct In-
tentive Canvass for Inter-
Religious Movement.

A council composed of pastor representatives of every protestant denomination in the city and of one delegate from every religious organization will supervise the canvass of the city in the interests of the inter-church world movement city survey to be conducted here, it was decided at a meeting of the ministerial alliance last night. Members of the council, who will later be chosen, will be asked to meet on the evening of Feb. 24, to perfect plans for the survey.

Dr. F. Louis Starbuck, superintendent of surveys in cities of more than 5,000 population in the state, excepting Chicago, who addressed the meeting last night, designated the inter-church world movement, in which Rock Island churches are to have a part, as one of the great religious movements ever undertaken. He outlined plans for the survey, to be made here as elsewhere throughout the state, as a preliminary measure to the launching of a great unified movement of the churches for christian growth.

The ministers present at the meeting voted to endorse the plan and carry on the work through a superintendent of canvass and assistants, whom the ministerial association will appoint.

The city survey will include a careful gathering of statistics in regard to the resources, plans, and

purpose of the churches and other religious organizations in the city, followed by a house to house canvass of the city to gather figures in regard to church affiliations. Various municipal agencies and others working for the welfare of the community will be asked to join with the churches in their work.

DEMAND THAT RAIL EMPLOYEES BE GIVEN INCREASE IN WAGE

Detroit, Mich., Feb. 6.—Formal insistence that favorable action be taken upon demands of the maintenance of way employes and railway shop laborers for wage increases, was decided upon by grand officers of the workers' brotherhood in conference here.

The union officers adopted a resolution this morning instructing their committee in Washington to inform Director-General Hines that seven days will be allowed for action on their demands.

Adoption of the resolution followed receipt of a telegram from

Vice President J. D. Mal'ry, acting for the brotherhood in Washington stating that the conference with Mr. Hines gave little promise of favorable action.

PARTY LEADERS TO STOP AT PALACE HOTEL IN FRISCO

San Francisco, Cal., Feb. 6.—The Palace hotel has been selected by George F. Mara, assistant to Homer S. Southern Demurrer Waived.
In circuit court this morning the demurrer filed by the stockholders and former operating officials of the Rock Island Southern Railway company, was overruled. The suit against the Southern, to enforce operation over the full line between Rock Island and Monmouth, was filed several weeks ago by Attorney General Brundage simultaneous with the action against the Southern's allied utilities company.

The Southern owners are given until the morning of Feb. 14 to file an answer to Brundage's bill. The arguments voiced in the demurrer for suspension of the bill were adjudged too weak to hold, by the court.

Under just what form of agreement the Northern Utilities company is to take over the furnishing of power accomplished hitherto by the Matherville company, is not known. The change will take place within 60 days, that time being necessary, according to the bill, for the installment of equipment
