



COLORED PEOPLE'S CELEBRATION. Murder of four Children, and Suicide, by a Father. Trial of Lydia Sherman for Poisoning.

FOREIGN NEWS. General Summary. [Reported Expressly for the Argus.]

New York, April 16.—A Washington special says that the reply to Earl Granville's second note is now ready to go out by the Wednesday steamer. It will not be made public, the Secretary deeming it inexpedient to do so. It is contended that one side or the other must recede within the next two months, and Beverly Johnson is given as authority for the statement that the President regrets that the claim for consequential damages was put in our case.

WASHINGTON, April 16.—The hall of the House of Representatives was densely crowded to-night on the occasion of the memorial services in honor of the late Prof. Morse. The Speaker of the House presided, assisted by Vice President Colfax. The President and Cabinet, Judges of the Supreme Court, together with the Governors of the States in person or by proxy, occupied the floor. In front of the main gallery was an oil painting of Prof. Morse. Around the outer frame of the portrait was the legend, "What hath God wrought." The ceremony opened with prayer by Rev. Dr. W. Adams, whose speaker became a brief introductory speech. Resolutions appropriate to the occasion were read and seconded by Senator Patterson in eloquent remarks, which were rapturously applauded. Cyrus W. Field read telegrams from London, Cairo, Bombay, Batavia, Singapore and Hong Kong. Despatches from Boston, St. Louis, Augusta, Maine, New York, Philadelphia, Buffalo, Montreal, and a great number of other cities were also read. Fernando Wood, the only present Member of Congress who was not in the first appropriation, introduced a resolution in support of the memorial. The colored people to-day celebrated the anniversary of the proclamation abolishing slavery in the District, by a procession, which is considered the finest ever witnessed in the city. The President and all the members of the Cabinet reviewed the procession from the portico of the White House. A reception this evening concluded the exercises.

LONDON, April 16.—The note accompanying the British counter case was delivered to the Board of Arbitration at Geneva. It calls the attention of the Arbitrators to the fact that a misunderstanding has arisen between Great Britain and the United States in regard to claims for indirect losses, which are placed under three heads: First, loss in the transfer of American shipping to the British flag. Second, loss from the prolongation of the war. The note proceeds to state that these claims are not admitted by the British government and that the correspondence is now in progress between that government and the United States in reference to that matter. The British government has thought proper to maintain the present counter case, which is strictly confined to direct losses sustained by Great Britain and the United States in the hope that the unfortunate misunderstanding will be removed. The arbitrators are formally notified that this counter case is presented without prejudice to the position assumed by the British government.

A man named Nicholas Shoemaker, residing at Maple Hill, a suburb of London, last night murdered his four children, then suicided.

NEW YORK, April 16.—Lydia Sherman, the alleged poisoner, was arraigned in New Haven to-day. She pleaded not guilty. A jury was obtained in half an hour and the testimony commenced. The trial is expected to continue for several days.

BALTIMORE, April 16.—Beverly Johnson says a special dispatch from Washington to a N. Y. paper giving him as authority for the statement that the President regrets that the claims for consequential damages were put in our case against England, is entirely untrue.
