NEWS TO DATE IN PARAGRAPHS

CAUGHT FROM THE NETWORK OF WIRES ROUND ABOUT THE WORLD.

DURING THE PAST WEEK

RECORD OF IMPORTANT EVENTS CONDENSED FOR BUSY PEOPLE.

WESTERN
The National Rural Letter Carriers' Association voted unanimously against affiliating with the American Federation of Labor at their meeting at Dallas, Texas.

Miss Ella Pratt, 22, of Walla Walla, Wash., a senior at Cornell college, has been ordained a minister by the Davenport district of the Upper Iowa Methodist Episcopal conference.

Flying from Laharpe, Ill., to Birmingham, Iowa, to visit a friend, L. C. Stout was instantly killed when attempting to land. One wing of his plane crumpled when 300 feet from the landing field.

A warehouse of the California Packing Corporation in the river front District Court at San Francisco by the destroyed by fire. Company officials estimated the loss at about \$1,500,000. The corporation had in storage there about 200,000 cases of canned goods.

Suit for \$1,700,145 inheritance taxes, interest and penalties alleged to be unpaid was filed in the United States district court at San Francisco by the government against the estate of the late Henry Miller, millionaire California cattleman.

The North Dakota state railroad commission reaffirmed its position on intrastate railroad rates and reissued orders increasing intrastate freight rates 35 per cent and passenger 20 per cent. A previous similar order was set aside by the state Supreme court on a technicality.

Officials of eight foreign countries and seventeen states, as well as the Philippines and Porto Rico, contemplate drafting bills similar to the Kansas Industrial Court law, according to letters of inquiry filed in the governor's office at Topeka, Kan. A draft of a similar act, proposed for Iowa, has been forwarded to Gov. Henry J. Allen for comment.

Bodies of two unidentified men, evidently slain by being beaten over the heads with a hammer and shot in the backs, were found in a field near Rola, N. D., by a farmer boy. The men were about 30 years old. The authorities believe they were murdered and their automobile stolen, as tracks of a machine led away from the scene.

Mrs. Irene Root Gordon of San Francisco has obtained an annulment of her marriage to James M. (Bluebeard) Watson, confessed murderer of nine women whom he had married, and who is now serving a life term in San Quentin state penitentiary. Mrs. Gordon said she was married to Watson at Sacramento, March 18, 1919, and that he left her shortly thereafter.

WASHINGTON

The state department at Washington has been advised that Rumania had deposited its ratification of the peace treaty, bringing the number of signatories up to twenty-six.

Establishment of a new supervising prohibition agents' department, consisting of the states of Arizona, New Mexico and Texas, was announced by the bureau of internal revenue.

Gradual return to the law of supply and demand as governing influence over prices and the end of "war charges" for necessary commodities has been predicted by government officials in explaining the government's attitude on credit extension.

News that Roberto Pesqueira, financial agent of the Mexican government at New York, called on Under Secretary Davis at the state department to urge immediate recognition of the new Mexican regime, caused something of a stir at the Mexican embassy. An official statement issued by the embassy said that it was the only agency authorized to speak for Mexico in the United States.

Consumption of wines and liquors in the United States in 1919 was less per capita than during any year since 1870, according to estimates of the department of commerce. In 1870 the amount was 7.70 gallons per capita, rising to 22.70 gallons in both 1907 and 1911 and falling to 9.17 gallons last year. The total consumption of wines and liquors in 1919 totaled 892,304,720 gallons, compared with a total of 1,701,827,271 gallons, or 15.95 gallons per capita in 1918.

Secretary Colby has refused to grant the request of anti-suffragists from Tennessee that he rescind his action in proclaiming ratification of the federal suffrage amendment on the basis of favorable action on the amendment by the Tennessee legislature.

Attorney General Palmer, it was declared at the department of justice, would use the Wall street explosion outrage as a lever upon Congress for legislation to strengthen the arm of the department for handling "Red" agitators in the country who seek to overthrow the government.

FOREIGN

Ada Bazar, twenty-three miles east of Ismid, has been captured by Greco-British troops, after sharp skirmishing.

Representatives of Italian employers and the striking workmen who have seized the factories have accepted Premier Giolitti's offer of mediation, it is stated in advices from Rome.

Three persons were killed and six injured in an explosion in the Infonlo powder factory at Mantau, says a Rome dispatch. The explosion, which damaged several houses, is believed to have been caused by parties unidentified.

An official report issued at Dublin castle shows that the attack on a motor lorry containing six policemen near La Hinch was more serious than announced. Six constables were killed, while soldiers assert they saw four of their assailants drop.

The Poles have reached Zbrucz river along the entire line, according to Tuesday's official communication, and Ukrainian troops have crossed the river. In the Pruzana region prisoners taken number 2,250. The communication adds that cavalry has occupied Oysterog, Buhrin and Derazono.

France will pay every dollar of the \$250,000,000 loan due in New York October 15th, M. Francois-Marshall, minister of finance, officially announced to the cabinet council at Paris. This sum is France's share of the \$500,000,000 Anglo-French loan floated in the United States during the war.

The suggestion accredited to Provisional President de la Huerta of Mexico that a "dry" zone be established in Mexico within sixty-five miles of the United States border will be discussed at an international convention of the border chamber of commerce at El Paso, Oct. 4, 5 and 6.

It was stated on reliable authority that the jewels belonging to the Romanoffs, Hapsburgs and Hohenzollerns, deposited for safety with Swiss banks and private firms, are worth \$87,000,000, while the jewels sold or pawned in Switzerland since 1911 by these families amounted to double this sum.

Canada is settling its housing problem by government action. The dominion government agreed to loan the provinces \$25,000,000 at 5 per cent, the loan to be repaid in twenty to thirty years. The provinces were empowered under certain simple conditions carrying responsibility to lend money to municipalities and municipalities were empowered to lend money to builders or to housing organizations, which are forbidden to pay dividends in excess of six per cent.

GENERAL

The Supreme Court of Maine has decided that a woman should not be required to tell her age in order to qualify as a voter.

Department of justice agents and the police are still without a definite clue to the identity of the persons responsible for explosion in Wall street.

J. Milton Smith, as counsel for James O'Brien of Mount Vernon, has filed a suit for \$50,000 against the city of New York for injuries received in the Wall street bomb explosion.

Manager J. M. Winn announced at Lexington, Ky., that the Kentucky Jockey Club would offer \$75,000 and a gold cup valued at \$5,000 for a race to be run in Kentucky this fall between Man o' War, Sir Barton and Exterminator.

Jail for not less than six months nor for more than one year will be the penalty for landlords who refuse to rent apartments to families with children, under a bill introduced in the assembly by Assemblyman O. J. Smith of New York.

Substitution of metal for wood in making shipping cases would increase the annual output of newsprint 4,000,000 pounds, E. W. Morgan of the Pneumatic Scales Corporation declared in an address before the American Institute of Chemical Engineers in New York.

Charged with shipping more than \$200,000 worth of automobiles stolen in Detroit thru eastern ports to Scandinavian countries, six Detroit persons, one of them a woman, have been arrested at Detroit, and are being held by federal authorities under the Dyer interstate automobile theft act, held under guard.

A million-dollar endowment fund for an institution where, speakers said, the world's most scientific bakers would be developed, was started by the American Association of the Baking Industry in annual convention at Atlantic City. More than \$400,000 was pledged. "Cheaper, better bread," will be the slogan on which the institution will be founded, it was announced.

All this talk about the horse becoming extinct because of the universal use of automobiles is idle gossip, according to the delegates who assembled at Chicago for the twenty-ninth annual convention of the Master Horsehoers' National Protective Association. Not only are horses increasing in numbers, but also in value, according to official statements, and transportation by horsepower still costs less than by motor truck.

Irregularities totaling \$6,000 have been discovered in the recruit payroll at the Great Lakes naval training station by a special board of investigation sent from Washington. Officials declared that the total may be more than \$75,000, as additional irregularities rapidly were being uncovered. Lieut. S. F. Sullivan, until three days ago in charge of the payroll, is being investigated.

Southwest News From All Over New Mexico and Arizona

According to estimates over 100 carloads of wheat will be shipped from Dedham, Des Moines and Grenville and probably three or four cars from Mt. Dora, N. Mex., this season.

The Citizens' State Bank of Mountainair, N. Mex., closed a contract with Contractor J. L. Hill for the erection of a modern two-story brick building on the corner of Broadway and Summit street, in that city.

One of the biggest real estate deals in the vicinity of Tucumcari, N. Mex., for some time was closed when the Williams & Hudson farm, containing 1,640 acres, was sold to parties in Oklahoma for the sum of \$32,000.

Among the many interesting exhibits to be shown at the Dona Ana county fair this year will be the finest saddle ever seen in New Mexico. The saddle is valued at over \$5,000. The trimmings are of gold and silver and all the metal work is hand carved in a most elaborate manner.

Announcement has been made of the construction of a fine gravel road between Albuquerque and Bernalillo. Bids for the building of the road will be opened early in October and the work will be started at the earliest possible date. A movement is also under way to build a new road to Jemez Springs.

The big picnic staged at Elda, N. Mex., by the people of Roosevelt county was probably the largest of its kind ever held in the county. A fine program was provided for the day consisting of all kinds of races, steer roping, bronc riding and ending with a big ball game in the afternoon and a dance in the evening.

The state corporation commission of Arizona has ordered that the contract entered into between the Yuma Gas and Electric Company and the City of Yuma with reference to the street lighting system there, with specified sizes of lamps and under specified rates, be approved. The contract is to run for two years.

Miss Marie Miller of Prescott, was killed and Harry Henry, son of Col. H. M. Henry, former army medical officer, had his back broken, and Miss Gladys Grove and W. Kehene were fatally injured when the automobile in which they were riding plunged over an embankment, forty miles from Nogales on the Tucson road.

An urgent request to the federal horticultural board for a regulation forcing railroad companies to clean, and, if necessary, disinfect railroad cars that have been used to haul cotton seed and seed cotton, has been included in a resolution adopted by the International League of the West, which was formed recently at Los Angeles.

Farmers on the Mule Creek and upper Gila sections of Grant county, N. M., are already planting winter wheat and the acreage this year will probably be the largest ever planted in the county. Experiments have proved that wheat is a very profitable crop and the new mill of the Gila Farms Milling Company offers a ready market for all the wheat raised in the county.

New Mexico funeral directors at the closing session of their state convention at Albuquerque decided to meet next year in El Paso in joint session with the Arizona and Texas association. Edward J. Neer of Portales, was elected president of the state association and C. A. Rising of Santa Fe, secretary. J. J. Castor of El Paso was chosen delegate to the national convention.

Less than half the registered voters of Maricopa county, Arizona, voted in the primary election, it was revealed when the board of supervisors completed its canvass of the primary. The total of votes cast, including both parties, was 10,288. The total of registrations was 23,512.

J. C. Goodwin of Tempe, who will be in charge of the mineral exhibits at the state fair at Phoenix this year, has been traveling over the state for the past few weeks making preliminary arrangements for securing and placing an unusually interesting collection of ore specimens in this department, which is most fortunate in having a splendid new mineral building to house its displays.

That prompt and effective means will be taken to prevent profiteering by hotels and restaurants in Phoenix during the week of the fair, November 8-13 inclusive, was indicated when the fair commission in a letter laid the matter before the Phoenix Chamber of Commerce with the suggestion that steps be taken at once to protect the fair name of the city from criticism on this score that has arisen in some quarters of the state.

A movement is being instituted by members of the 158th Infantry, which is Arizona's own, and which departed itself so laudably in the Mexican Border wars, and later with the American Expeditionary forces in France, to have a big reunion in Phoenix during fair week, November 8-13.

Reports from the town of Duran, N. Mex., state that homesteaders are coming into that vicinity so rapidly that there are very few homesteads left. Indications are that in the next five years this will be one of the best farming sections in the state.
