FIGHTING FIRE IN THE HOME

What should be feared more
 than the burning of the home?
 There is danger that the lives of the
 loved ones, or our own, will be lost;
 danger of loss of pictures and gifts
 of absent or dead dear ones, and
 other precious things that money
 could not get again. But in few
 houses, very few, is there anything
 at hand with which to put out a
 starting fire, that would make
 ashes of these household treasures
 and of the home as well, says the
Times-Union.

A ladder is often needed to get
 water to a fire started in the roof,
 or attic, by sparks and to save the
 lives of persons in the upper stor-
 ies, for a fire in a dwelling soon
 makes the stairway impassable
 from smoke or flames. A ladder
 can be made in a day, or bought
 ready made for \$3.

In a farm house kitchen there
 should be a bucket kept full of
 water with which to stay a starting
 fire. The bucket used for water
 for cooking and drinking is full less
 than half the time, and may be
 empty at the wrong time. Fire
 buckets are made with round bot-
 toms and held up by a shelf with a
 hole in it, or hung on a nail. One
 could not put to any other use a
 bucket that would not stand on its
 own bottom so it would not be
 removed from its place. In win-
 ter salt is put in the water in a fire
 bucket to keep it from freezing.
 Such a bucket should be kept on
 each floor of every home. They
 may be hidden in ornamental box-
 es.

The most effective piece of appar-
 atus for putting out a starting
 fire is one of the metal tanks known
 as "carbonic acid gas extinguish-
 ers," which are seen on nearly every
 fire department wagon. They hold
 two bucketfuls of water and have a
 diameter one third their height.
 At the top of the tank is a piece of
 hose a yard long. When the tank
 is inverted, ready for use, sulphur-
 ic acid is spilled, from a bottle in
 its top, into a cupful of baking soda.
 When they get together soda water
 is formed which makes a pressure
 that will throw the water and gas
 in the tank forty feet, or into in-
 closed places which could not be
 reached with a water bucket.

The gas carried by the water
 helps greatly in smothering the
 flames. If water carrying car-
 bonic acid is thrown on a fire be-
 tween a ceiling and the floor above
 it, the blaze is smothered at once
 by lack of air. This extinguisher
 is most used from above the blaze,
 because carbonic acid gas being
 heavier than air falls. Each of the
 three gallons of water in the can
 takes out with it twenty gallons of
 gas. Firemen have carbonic acid
 tanks holding forty gallons, which
 are called chemical engines, for use
 on fires that have ignited only one
 or two rooms. They cause little
 water damage.

Twenty-one makers of these ex-
 tinguishers have them officially
 tested with a pressure of 380 pounds
 to the square inch, so there is no
 danger of one of them exploding
 while in the embrace of the user.
 There being no trust in the busi-
 ness, competition will probably
 keep the prices right.

Tubes of "dry powder extinguis-
 her" have in them baking soda to
 throw on a fire. Firemen think
 the dry soda in them of little use.

Hand grenades are bottles of
 fluid which are kept for breaking on
 a starting fire. Many of them con-
 tain ammonia to choke a blaze.
 Grenades are little used except in
 ships.

Any substance must be made hot
 before it will take fire. When the
 heat is great enough to loosen the

atoms of carbon in it, so they can
 join atoms of the oxygen in the air
 which they dearly love, there is a
 blaze. Anything that will cool the
 burning substance, so there is no
 longer heat enough to turn loose
 the carbon atoms, will put out the
 fire.

Water takes more heat away
 from burning material than any
 other fluid or substance. A fire
 that would heat water to 212 de-
 grees Fahrenheit, making it boil,
 would make any other material
 very much hotter. Water cools
 the red-hot coals and so stops the
 fire. Aside from this a deluge of
 water keeps air away from burning
 substances. And, too, water on a
 fire is changed to steam and that
 change draws away heat.
