Scalloped Apples.
Select a half dozen apples. Wash and core. Slice across apple so that each piece will be enclosed by the skin of the apple. Place in a stewing or frying pan, pouring over them about one-fourth of a cupful of water, three-fourths of a cupful of sugar—though amount of sugar is best determined by acidity of apples—and a tablespoonful of butter. Cover and allow to simmer. When soft remove, cover and fry. When sufficiently brown place in a rather deep dish alternate layers of the apples and grated cheese. Place in the oven for five or ten minutes and serve in the same dish in which they were scalloped.—Boston Post.


