FREEMAN MUST SERVE HIS TIME IN CAMPS

Convicted of Embezzling Tampa City Funds—Five Years.

Z. P. Freeman, former collector of taxes of Tampa, who has been confined in the county jail here for some time waiting action on his appeal to the state supreme court for a new trial on the charge of embezzlement of city funds for which he was convicted about five months ago, was yesterday sent to the convict camps of T. E. Bridges & Co., who yesterday sent a man there from Jacksonville to convey him to their camps. The attorney of Mr. Freeman, Messrs. MacFarlane & Davis and J. T. McCollum, had abandoned all hope of securing a new trial for him and he now goes to serve out a five years' sentence imposed upon him by Judge Horace C. Gordon of the Hillsborough county criminal court. It is understood that a move will be made to secure Freeman's pardon.

There was quite a sorrowful scene at the county jail yesterday morning when Freeman bade farewell to his wife and little daughter, the parting of the husband and wife being one of quiet sorrow, but the child sobbed in a pitiful manner when the time arrived for saying goodbye to her father.
