DAVANT HEADS VETTRANSE FOR THE COMING YEAR

Bartow Named as the Next Meeting Place of the Florida Brigade. Having Great Time.

Live Oak, Oct. 21.—South Florida is in the saddle. At the business session of the Florida Brigade, U. C. V., assembled here for state reunion, this morning Bartow was unanimously selected as the meeting place for 1910.

Gen. John C. Davant of Brooksville was elected to the position of brigadier-general and will command the Florida division for the coming year. The veterans are greatly pleased with both selections. General Davant, one of the most picturesque figures in the convention, was made the unanimous choice for commander.

More than 400 veterans are present. This city has welcomed them with open arms, so far as entertainment is concerned. Fully 5,000 visitors are here.

MAURA LEADS CABINET IN RESIGNING JOBS

Another Crisis Forced on King Alfonso of Spain.

Madrid, Oct. 21.—The political disturbance in Spain has been further aggravated by the resignation of the entire cabinet, which occurred this afternoon. Premier Maura tendered his resignation and the remainder of the cabinet followed his example in accordance with their rank.

The resignation of the Spanish cabinet follows closely upon the report, made public a few days ago, that King Alfonso had taken exception to the activity of the premier in connection with the execution of Professor Ferrer. The king alleges that Maura did not consult him in the matter and thereby allow him to exercise the royal prerogative of clemency.

The report stated that Alfonso called the minister to the throne room and administered a sharp rebuke and that Maura was deeply offended. It was understood that his resignation and that of the entire cabinet would follow.

The fall of the cabinet was regarded as inevitable also, after the bitter speech of the minister of the interior in the chamber of deputies last night, during which he classed the liberals with the republicans and socialists, who were arrayed against the throne.
