\$18,000 ON HAND IN VOLUSIA COUNTY

Board met pursuant to adjournment, on November 1. Present, G. W. Fisher, chairman; R. D. Brooke, J. G. Cade, S. B. Owens and S. D. Jordan, Clerk.

The following road and bridge reports were submitted: District No. 1.—Repairs on Orange City and Enterprise road and Enterprise and Osteen road.

District No. 2.—Repairs to DeLand and Orange City shell road, pinestrawing DeLand Junction road to St. Johns River, 1 mile pinestraw on DeLand and DeLeon road, and repairs to bridge on DeLand and Daytona road.

District No. 3.—Pinestrawing DeLand and DeLeon road, repairs Barberville and Volusia road and repairs bridge on Seville and Daytona road; also progress on DeLeon shell road.

District No. 5.—General repairs. The attorneys of the board were instructed to draw contract for rent of Daytona Armory to State for one year, on condition that the State pay a rental of \$25.00 per month for same.

The report of committee appointed to mark and view road from Orange City to Thrasher's Ferry was received and filed, committee discharged, and opening of the road ordered advertised for 30 days along following lines to-wit: Beginning at the intersection of Blue Springs avenue with Volusia avenue, in Orange City; run west on Blue Springs avenue, crossing the main line of the Atlantic Coast Line railway at the vicinity of the grading of the abandoned "Y" of the A. & W. railway, thence southerly sufficiently distant from the A. C. L. railway to avoid low land and pond hollows near the railway line, to the quarter section stake in the south line of section 17, 18, 30; thence due south along quarter section lines to the center of sect. 8, 19, 30; thence south 45° east to a point in lot 3 of Section 16, 19, 30, on the shore of St. Johns river about 150 yards west of the A. C. L. railway bridge for a ferry landing.

The Notary Bonds of Anne B. Hobbs, F. N. Conrad and W. A. Aman were approved.

Revolver and rifle bonds were approved and clerk instructed to issue licenses therefor as follows: M. Beasley, I. J. Vass, F. R. Swift, M. E. Barker, and H. E. Zieppered.

The pension claim of Mrs. A. J. Derieux was approved.

John Hubbard was allowed \$8.00 per month in supplies until further order of board. Neal Morrison was allowed the sum of \$5.00 per month towards his support.

The communication of Howe & Currier in relation to condition of Enterprise and Lake Ashby road was referred to Com. Brooke.

The attorneys of Board were instructed to notify A. S. J. Marsh to remove obstruction he has placed on Enterprise and New Smyrna road at once.

The clerk was instructed to notify the Tampa Board of Trade that main roads in Volusia county have mile boards already erected.

The clerk of the board was authorized to purchase 3 sets of andirons, four 6-foot iron benches, 600 lbs. fertilizer, 60 lbs rye seed and wire trash basket for county use; also to have lattice screen placed in front of court house wood yard and water faucets placed in court house yard.

The following resolution was adopted and ordered spread upon the minutes: "Resolved, That after a careful investigation of the charges against Charles Swartengreen as captain of county convicts, we find no proof of his being intoxicated while on duty and further that he has not gone beyond his rights in his treatment of unruly convicts."

"It is further ordered that the clerk notify the Commissioner of Agriculture that the board will do all in its power to conform to State regulations for the care of county convicts."

The clerk was instructed to advertise for bids for the lease of all county convicts whose time shall be over 5 months and who shall be over the age of

16 years, females excepted, providing in said notice that the lessee shall furnish said convicts with all necessary supplies.

Criminal Court cost bills were approved for \$686.14.

The Volusia County Record was designated as the newspaper in which to publish tax statement of 1909.

The following resolution was adopted and ordered spread upon the minutes: "Resolved, That at the next meeting of the Board the matter of proposing a bond issue for \$250,000 or such other sum as deemed advisable, for the purpose of building good roads in Volusia County, be taken up and considered."

The treasurer's report for October was examined and approved and paid warrants destroyed. Statement from report:

Miscellaneous bills against the county were examined and approved and warrants drawn in payment of same; after which the board adjourned for the month.

STETSON TRIUMPHANT.

First Football Game of Season Won by the Champions.

Stetson; 10; Olympics, 0.
The Olympic football team, of Jacksonville, which played the Stetson team in DeLand on Saturday afternoon, were just "not in it," the home team winning easily by a score of 10 to 0.

Game was called at 3:25, and in four and a half minutes Stetson had made her first touch-down and scored 5 points. The second touch-down was made just before the finish of the first half.

In the second half neither team scored.

The Jacksonville team, while somewhat heavier than the Stetson team, was not up on team-work. The only ground gained by them, with one exception, was by kicking. Stetson went right through their line, but was weak on kicking, failing three to kick goal.

No one was seriously hurt. Three of Stetson's players were taken out during the game, apparently being soft. By hard work the team ought to be in good condition for the game with Florida University, which will take place in DeLand Saturday afternoon. Immediately after the shooting Lulu took to the high grass, and the officers were unable to locate her. A crowd soon gathered around the shanty in front of the jail, where the

shooting was done. From what could be learned, the man and woman had been carousing and quarreling all day, and Rowe had beaten her up. The shooting, it was claimed, was done in self-defense. Three shots were fired, only one of which took effect. Before shooting Lulu used a knife, but the injuries were not serious.

Lulu came in this morning and gave herself up to the officers. A preliminary hearing will probably take place today.
