NEGRO LYNCHED IN VICTIMS SIGHT
ASSAULTED YOUNG GIRL IN ATLANTA SUBURB.
Atlanta, July 31.—Floyd Carmichael a negro about 22 years old, who was identified by Miss Annie Pool of Lakewood, a suburb of Atlanta, as the man who had assaulted her early today, was shot in front of the Pool residence in sight of his victim this afternoon by a posse which captured him. After he had been shot there were cries of "Burn him" but the county police arriving at this time prevented such action.

About 10 o'clock this morning while returning from a visit to friends Miss Annie Pool, 15-year-old daughter of J. J. L. Poole, was attacked by the negro and choked into unconsciousness. When the alarm was given a posse quickly formed, but it was not until late in the afternoon that the negro was captured and brought into Miss Poole's presence, who immediately identified him, crying "That's him." A volley of shots rang out and the negro fell dead.—Ex.

SHERIFF CORLEY CORRELS GAMBLERS.
A HAUL MADE ON THE BANKS OF SALUDA RIVER, ELEVEN ARRESTS BEING MADE.
Columbia, S. C., July 29.—Sheriff Corley of Lexington, corraled a large bunch of gamblers on the banks of the Saluda river near Columbia, and arrested eleven. He has the names of twenty-five more who escaped.
Among the prisoners were several well known Columbia Knights of the pastebards. Among the Lexington prisoners was T. D. Mitchell, one of the leading witnesses for the prosecution in the Tillman murder trial, but more recently known to fame as a defendant in the ballot box stuffing case from Broadland.—Chronicle.

CONFEDERATE VETERANS THE GUESTS OF THE TOWN ON ITS ANNIVERSARY.
Saluda, July 29.—On July 28, 1866, the cornerstone of the court house for Saluda county was held here and yesterday marked the tenth anniversary of that event. The day has been regularly celebrated, sometimes in one way, sometimes in another. Yesterday there was a reunion of the old soldiers of the county and this, together with the sisters of the district conference, brought a large crowd to this town.

The number of those who followed Lee and Jackson and Hampton and Butler in the dark days are growing fewer each year. There were about a hundred here yesterday and they were made to enjoy themselves. The town was turned over to them. Kindnesses were shown them. They were in fact made much of by their sons and daughters who cherish their glorious deeds of valor on the field of battle as a rich heritage and whose empty sleeves and missing limbs are regarded as badges of highest honor.
The veterans with Larkin Rice, a private in Company K, Fourteenth South Carolina regiment, in command, were formed in a line on the public square and marched to a shady grove nearby, where addresses on the incidents of the war were made by veterans W. S. Wightman, B. E. Sample, Sr., and others.
A free barbecue dinner was served to every veteran present. This they enjoyed to their heart's content. In the afternoon they gathered in small squads under the shade of the oaks and "fought all their battles over."
