including Moty Tiger, chief of the Crooks; Green M. Curtin, of the Choctaws; Douglas H. Johnston, of the Chickasaws; John Brown, of the Seminoles, and William Rogers, of the Cherokees. Quannah Parker, of the Comanches; Black Dog, of the Osages; Bull Thunder, of the Arapahoes, and chiefs of other tribes were also in attendance, several of them with numerous tribal representatives.

Poncas, Kaws, Iowas, Cheyennes and Pawnees were in the parade, but the most of them did not get very far away from Island Park, where the barbecue was prepared and served.

**PARADE IS A GRAND AFFAIR**

The inaugural parade in several particulars was typical of pioneer days. Adjutant General Niles and his assistants had a difficult time getting the various Indian tribes, the soldiers and civic and secret organizations in line, but when this was accomplished the parade passed in good order. In guarding the line John R. Abernathy rode his famous wolf catching gray pony, the animal that brought distinction to the owner during President Roosevelt's wolf hunt in Oklahoma three years ago.

The Oklahoma National Guard, with 500 men in line; the Indian Territory Volunteer Militia, with 400 men, and the Cadets from the University Preparatory School at Toukawa, under Lieutenant C. D. Crusan, of the

Fourth Infantry, U. S. A., constituted the military feature of the parade, together with the regimental band from Edmond.

Another feature was the girls band of Perkins, while a band composed entirely of full blooded Cherokee Indian girls attracted great attention. Numerous other musical organizations had places in the line.

A place of honor in the parade was given to James A. Kirkwood, of Guthrie, and his "Anti Horse Thief" followers, 400 of them being mounted for the occasion. Kirkwood is the president of this organization, which has a membership of 100,000, constituting the biggest police force in the United States.

The governors of the five civilized tribes occupied one carriage, and in another were Bird S. McGuire, Congressman from the First Oklahoma District, who represented Oklahoma during the day, and a full blooded Choctaw Indian girl, who represented Indian Territory. This carriage attracted particular attention for the reason that one of the afternoon's features was the wedding ceremony uniting the Territories in one State.
