

**ANOTHER HOLD-UP AND SANDBAGGING**

**ONE MAN ROBBED ON STREET IN COLUMBIA, ANOTHER SLUGGED IN DARK ALLEY—NO ARRESTS MADE.**

Columbia, S. C., May 18.—The police have been pretending not to know anything about it all day, but it transpires this afternoon that another hold up and highway robbery occurred in Columbia early Sunday morning.

A white highwayman, masked with automobile goggles, and aided by a negro, held up W. O. Sleigh, an electrician, at the point of a revolver, and robbed him of \$10 and a bundle containing a hat. The hold up occurred while Mr. Sleigh was on his way to his home on Lumber street, not far from Assembly street.

Mr. Sleigh reported the matter to the police department, and a police man, coming upon the highwaymen, started in pursuit, but they fired on him, when about 50 feet away. He returned the fire. The robbers drop-

ped the bundle, which was recovered and identified as the property of Mr. Sleigh. There are no clues to the persons and no solution of the mystery is probable.

A little earlier there was what appears to have been a case of sandbagging. Arthur M. Rodgers, a line-man for the Southern Bell Telephone company, was found in an alley, two doors south of his home on Bull street, in an unconscious condition.

Mr. J. F. Drake, a trolley conductor, found Mr. Rodgers in the alley, and saw an unknown man standing over him. The mysterious man ran as Mr. Drake approached. The police have been searching for him all day, but there have been no developments. Neither Mr. Rodgers' watch nor money were molested, though there were indications of a hard struggle. The police authorities believe it to be a case of sand bagging. Mr. Rodgers is still in a serious condition.

**DISPENSARY HEARING MAY 26.**

**CHIEF JUSTICE FULLER TO SIT AT RICHMOND AND REVIEW THE CASE.**

Columbia, May 15.—Attorney General Lyon this afternoon received

from the clerk of the Federal Court of Appeals, of Richmond, a telegram, stating that Chief Justice Fuller has fixed Tuesday, May 26, to hear the dispensary case. This is the case in which the State has appealed from the orders of Judge Pritchard in regard to the State dispensary funds and the whole question of Judge Pritchard's course will be brought up at this hearing, and the status of the

dispensary funds fully argued before the Court of Appeals. From that Court the case will doubtless be taken to the Supreme Court of the United.
