WORKING AUGUSTA ROAD.

LEXINGTON SUPERVISOR PUTTING HIGHWAY IN EXCELLENT CONDITION

Lexington July 6—The county chaingang is now at work on the Augusta road, near Cayce, through the famous Hogabaw swamp. This has been one of the most troublesome pieces of road in the county but Supervisor Langford stated yesterday that when he finished it this time it would compare most favorably with any section of road in the county. The width of the road, where the gang is opening it up, is 30 feet, fully wide enough for all purposes.

Mr. Langford stated that he would also complete the Augusta road between Lexington and Batesburg in time for the new highway from Atlanta to Washington, mention of which was made a few weeks ago. When Mr. Weldon, secretary of the association, was here he did not get to see the supervisor, but he assured correspondent yesterday that he will do all in his power to get the road to pass through Lexington county.

WHITE MAN ARRESTED.

Lexington, July 7.—J. W. Smith, a white man, was arrested and lodged in jail by Deputy Sheriff Miller yesterday upon a warrant sworn out by Messrs. Riley & Haigler Bros. of Swansea, charging him with obtaining goods under false pretense to the amount of \$95. Smith is a contractor and it seems that he built the storehouse of the late W. H. F. Rast at Swansea, and it was while he was doing the work, it is alleged, that he secured the goods. The arrest was made at the home of his father-in-law, Mr. Paul Shealy, at Leesville, where he has a wife and an infant only about a week old. Smith claims to be a native of Georgia and says that he has a brother who is a bank cashier at

Brunswick, Ga. His people have been notified of his predicament and it is thought that an effort will be made to amicably adjust the matter.

URGES DISMISSAL OF HAVIRD CASE

SALUDA GRAND JURY RECOMMENDS THAT CHARGES BE DROPPED.

Saluda, July 7.—The grand jury, which completed its work and was discharged yesterday afternoon, in the presentment states that there are but five inmates in the county poor house.

A most striking recommendation is in reference to the charge against Pope B. Havird for murder. It will be recalled that Havird was indicted at the December term of court on the charge of killing a negro some ten years ago. Upon a true bill being found his attorney moved for a change of venue upon numerous affidavits to the effect that it was doubtful if Havird could get a fair and impartial trial before a Saluda jury. Judge Shipp granted the change of venue and the case was sent over to Edgefield for trial. At the last term of court for that county it was continued. The following in reference to that case occurs in the final presentment of the grand jury yesterday.

A true bill was found by former grand jury against Pope B. Havird for a murder alleged to have been committed 10 years ago. As petitions signed by some of the best men of our county, together with evidence including the father of the supposed dead man, that he is still alive, we recommend that the case be set aside.

There was no exhibits attached to the presentment showing who signed the petitions or skowing the contents of the petitions or showing on what is based the statement that the supposed dead man is alive.

As a matter of fact the people of the county at large have taken very little interest in the prosecution of Havird in this matter. The information was given the Solicitor in the discharge of his duty investigated the matter and had a warrant issued and handed out an indictment against

Havird. The grand jury before whom the bill went last year, of which at least six of the present grand jury were members, promptly returned a true bill. As stated the case of Havird's own showing was transferred to Edgefield county and is now on the docket there.

Some of Havird's kinsmen have asserted that they saw the negro's dead body in the woods where he and Havird were splitting rails and that Havird piled brush and logs on the corpse and burned it.
