## A BIG CHURN.

**Over 12 Feet Long and 4 Wide: 500 Gallons Capacity**

The boy who used to pound wearily at the old up-and-down dasher, with the cream spattering on his trousers and his mind away on the fish in the brook, would have shrunk aghast at the thought of a churn a hundred times as big, that was 12 feet and 3 inches long by 4 feet and 1 inch in diameter; that held 500 gallons of cream and could produce 1500 pounds of butter at a churning.

But that churn has no terrors for the small boy now. It is run by steam and could turn out its grist of three quarters of a ton of butter every three hours—if there was that much cream in the valley—and never bat an eye. As a matter of fact it does turn out an average of 600 pounds a day, and not only supply all that Imperial eats, but sends a great deal away to the "inside", as we call the coast country, where it is highly appreciated and they smack their lips over Imperial butter.

The creamery belongs to Mr. Hage, a San Diego man who has Mr. Cooper in charge here.

The dairymen bring in the cream only, separating it from the milk on their ranches. By this they save much hauling, for a 10-gallon can of cream, weighing about 82 pounds, represents a thousand pounds of milk.

The most of the dairymen supplying the cream are from the country south, near Heber, Silsbee and Calexico.

## Handcart Service Outgrown

Mail carrier Brown who carries the mails between the postoffice and the trains, is about discarding the handcart he has heretofore used for a horse and wagon, the mails having outgrown to capacity of the cart. They often amounted to twenty bags at a load, including that of most of the rest of the valley. All has been heretofore left here except Brawley. Now by the extension of train service to Heber and Calexico these will also be cut out, but Holtville and Silsbee remain with the Imperial mail at this station.


