HOLTVILLE.

A reception was given in honor of Mrs. Wilbur Hall, a recent bride, at the home of Mrs. George Peacock, Thursday last week. A company of Holtville ladies was taken to the Peacock ranch by four-horse conveyance and spent the day.

H. H. Peterson has increased the equipment of his brick plant at Holtville by the installation of a fifty-horsepower motor, which has been installed by the Holton Power Company.

City Trustee H. J. Messinger is in communication with several well drillers, and within a short time actual operations on the Holtville test well will be started.

Holtville City Trustees are advertising for sale the recently voted bond issue of \$37,000 for municipal improvements. Bids will be opened on November 22.




