

COUNTY NOTES

BRAWLEY

E. A. DeBlais has been appointed a notary public.

Mr. and Mrs. L. P. Abbott have gone to Los Angeles to spend the summer.

C. O. Young and family have come from Edmond, Oklahoma, to make their home in Brawley.

Brawley is shipping a large quantity of summer squash, onions, etc., to the Los Angeles markets.

Earl C. Pound represented the Brawley Odd Fellows at the sessions of the Grand Lodge at Fresno last week.

New potatoes raised on the Brawley townsite have been in the market the past week. They are of the Peerless variety.

R. E. Merritt, of Globe, Arizona, assessor of Gila county, has been spending a few days with his father in Brawley.

James Pinkney has started a dairy on the Elder ranch, in Water District No. 8, and last week received a string of forty high-grade cows.

The Brawley Meat and Supply Company has offered to the city the use of the deep ditch on land at the banks of New River as a point to dump city rubbish.

The Brawley City Trustees are calling for bids for furnishing to the city a team of horses and an outfit suitable for grading streets and cleaning ditches, etc.

J. E. Arnold, who has recently sold half of his ranch property near Wiest, will reside in Brawley, and plans to erect several cottages for rent within the next few months.

The freight record for Brawley was broken on Monday of last week, when the Southern Pacific brought in eighteen cars of cattle, three cars of lumber, three cars of cantaloupe shoo, three cars of merchandise, one car of lime and one car of machinery.

E. H. Erickson on May 3 shipped the first apricots of the Brawley section to Los Angeles. The fruit was of the Neweast variety. Mr. Erickson has an orchard of twenty acres, which netted him handsome profits last year and gives promise of being even more remunerative this season.

CALEXICO

Hotel Calexico is to be connected with the new municipal water system at once.

Z. Frank Little has been appointed deputy County Horticultural Commissioner for the southern end of Imperial county.

At 10 o'clock on June 4 the county will sell at public auction lot 3 of block 54, on which the branch county jail now stands.

The new school census for Calexico school district shows 225 children of school age, an increase of forty-four over the number shown in last year's census.

The Calexico City Council has adopted an ordinance establishing street grades, sidewalk regulations, shade tree and gutter lines.

Pope Hixon and family have gone to Old Mexico, to establish a home in the Yaqui River Valley in the vicinity of the ranch of V. Gant.

Miss Gertrude Simmons, who has been residing in Calexico for several months, this week started on the return trip to her home in Janesville, Wisconsin.

The First State Bank of Calexico is petitioning to have permission to change its name to the Calexico Savings Bank. This petition will be heard in the Imperial County Superior Court on May 27.

While examining a gun which he thought was not loaded, O. U. Patterson accidentally discharged the weapon, and the bullet struck his cheek bone and glanced off his skull, leaving a flesh wound.

Calexico now has two hose carts and 900 feet of fire hose. A fire house and drying tower will be erected. A hook and ladder outfit has been ordered and will arrive soon. It is proposed to organize a volunteer fire company at once.

Fritz Kloke, president of the Cal-

exico National Bank, has started on a trip to Alaska to look after personal interests at Nome. Mr. Kloke spent several years in Alaska. He expects to close out his Alaskan interests while absent and concentrate all his capital in Imperial Valley enterprises.

HOLTVILLE

A new kiln of 300,000 has just been burned at the Holtville brick yards.

R. A. Hackett has come from Salt Lake to take a position in the Holtville Department Stores.

A litter of young coyotes was captured on the Bliss ranch, adjoining Holtville on the north, last Sunday.

C. E. Carlisle has secured a lease on a forty-acre ranch northeast of Holtville, and will engage in dairying.

Miss Fern Buckmaster, of Redlands, has been visiting in the home of King L. Kendle, and has now gone to Brawley to visit her brother.

Rev. P. P. Carroll, of Santa Barbara who owns a ranch near Holtville, has purchased a ten-acre tract in the Alamo subdivision from H. B. Gillespie.

Bert Osburn, conductor on the Holtton Interurban Railroad, was stung by a large scorpion while dressing, Monday, and was made quite ill from its effects.

W. F. Carroll and W. D. Everett, of Santa Barbara, have been visiting Holtville, and while there purchased a ten-acre tract of land in the Alamo subdivision.

Water Company No. 7 has levied an assessment of seventy-five cents per share on the issued capital stock of that corporation, and unpaid assessments will become delinquent on May 31.

Prof. Blanchard, principal of the Holtville schools, was called to Covina the first of this week by the serious illness of his brother. Miss Nellie Jones has assumed his place in the schools during his absence.

The artesian well on the Henry Stroven ranch is flowing 100 gallons per minute from a two-inch casing reaching to a depth of 812 feet. The water is 105 degrees temperature and appears to be of the same quality as that of the Holtville wells.

Ed E. Boyd has returned to Holtville, after a visit of three weeks at his father's home in Monrovia. He is much improved in health. After a few days in the valley Mr. Boyd will start on a trip to Oregon, and will return to the valley early in July.

The building being erected by King L. Kendle, on Holt avenue will have a fifty-foot frontage. It will be one story, but the walls will be of sufficient thickness to carry a second story when desired. Mr. Kendle is also erecting a residence in Holtville.

Mrs. T. Elizabeth White, of San Francisco, mother of J. S. White of Holtville, has given to the Catholic Church a lot in Holtville and another lot lying beside this gift has been purchased. The two will be used as the site for a church and parochial residence.

The Holtville Natatorium Company has cleaned up all its indebtedness and is now planning to go ahead at once with the erection of a natatorium building which will be 68x100 feet. The building will contain forty dressing rooms, four private baths, shower baths, a ladies' rest room and an office.

County Recorder J. B. Baker has announced through the medium of his newspaper, the Holtville Tribune, that he will not be a candidate to succeed himself in the office of County Recorder. He says he feels he cannot longer afford to sacrifice his personal business to serve the people as a public officer.

Fred Fuller, owner of the Central garage at El Centro, is establishing a branch garage at Imperial.

Dr. R. H. Power is a delegate to the Grand Lodge of the Odd Fellows at Fresno, and has been spending two weeks in the central part of the state.

After an examination at the State University of the brain and spinal cord of the dog killed in Imperial, which was supposed to be afflicted with hydrophobia, no evidence of this disease has been found.

D. M. Morgan, professor of agriculture in the Imperial Valley Union High School, has been authorized by the University of California to make tuberculin tests free of charge in any within the ensuing eight weeks.

The Christian Church congregation at Imperial last Sunday adopted resolutions expressing deep appreciation of the services of Rev. J. E. Bell as minister for the past seven months. The Berean Bible class presented Mr. Bell a fountain pen. He will go north to assume a new pastorate.

By the removal of Attorney H. W. Brewer to his ranch, outside of the Imperial school district, a vacancy has been created on the Imperial Valley Union High School board. At a meeting of patrons of the school, held Monday, after numerous ballots had been taken it was decided that a request should be made that the County Superintendent of Schools appoint George Varney to fill the vacancy. Some opposition has arisen to the re-engagement of Prof. Mott H. Arnold as principal of the school, and at this meeting a petition signed by forty-four of the high school students was presented, asking that Prof. Arnold be retained as principal.
