MINES AND MINING

LORDSBURG MINING REVIEW

B. Blackburn is making good headway in driving his shaft on the Copper Circle group of copper mines.

Bain and Akers are taking out fine ore from the "99" mine on the 170-foot level. Shipments will very shortly be commenced.

Black and Anderson have just made a new strike of high grade No. 3 shaft at 240-foot level, have galena ore on the Waldo mines.

The Bonney Mining Company on No. 3 shaft at 240-foot level, have just encountered another fine vein of ore, and are making regular shipments to the smelters. The lessees on No. 2 shaft at the third level have just struck another high grade pay streak.

Wells and Choll have just taken a lease on No. 1 shaft and are sinking a fine vein of ore.

Lordsburg parties are now arranging to plot a townsite between Shakespeare and the 85 mine. Also arranging with drillers to sink for water to supply the townsite.

Good progress is now being made by the 85 mine with their core drills on the Atwood mine.

Cal Randall is fast developing another new strike on the Nellie Ely mine.

W. B. Randall left for Douglas on business, on his way back to Lordsburg he will stop over at Paradise to arrange to ship a carload of lead ore to El Paso from property around by him and Dr. Crocker.

Her hatred is aroused and she joins the nihilists. Her brother Ivan is sent by the Czar to China with an important message and Olga accompanies him. On the voyage she meets Lieutenant Dare of the U. S. Navy, with whom she falls in love. They encounter many things while in China. Four years elapse. She has a son by Prince Ching, whom she was forced to marry to save the lives of Ivan and the Russian minister. In the meantime Dare has been hunting for her, as Olga had been hunted ashore during a ship wreck and had been lost. He finds where she is and leads a rescue party. In the fight the prince accidentally shoots his own son. Dare wishes to take Olga with him. She says it is impossible, and the picture fades away.

On Sunday night the Mutual Masterpieces present "The Patriot and the Spy," a four-part drama featuring Marguerite Snow, Alphonse Ethier and James Cruise and a large company of supporting players. Proceedings of Justice Court Five of the dusky citizens of Lordsburg tried to run the city on Monday night, but were headed off to the city jail as guests of the county.

Last Monday night at about 11:20, an unknown Mexican, who was later identified as Paulo Herrera, formerly of Miami, was shot by Jimmie Hughes. The Mexican and his partner had been in Johnny Brown's saloon about 45 minutes before and became angry at something that was said. They seemed to be rather hilarious and after breaking a few bottles out on the table in front of the saloon they departed. When they returned, they walked up to Jimmie, who was sitting on the edge of the pool table in Brown's saloon, one of the Mexicans began pulling a mine's candle stick about fourteen inches long, from the front of his shirt and began striking at Jimmie with it. Jimmie climbed upon the table and down on the opposite side when the Mexican and his partner started around the table after him. Jimmie was in a corner and pulled a Colt .45. He ordered them to keep back three distinct times, but they kept closing in on him. He pulled the trigger and both Mexicans ran for the back door. Later investigation showed one Mexican lying at the corner of Roberts and Leahy store in bad shape. He was taken to Dr. Crocker's office but died just after arriving there. The Mexican was shot through the abdomen, the bullet passing entirely through the body.

A coroner's inquest was held on Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock and the State of New Mexico versus James Hughes for shooting one Paulo Herrera was exonerated.

Preliminary hearing was held on Wednesday evening in the Justice of Peace court. County Attorney C. C. Royall moved after presentation of evidence because of lack of sufficient evidence to justify carrying the case to the Superior Court. The case accordingly done by Justice Marsalis.
