

# SANTA FE GRAND DIVISIONS NOW KNOWN AS DISTRICTS

J. E. Hurley now divides honors with C. W. Kouns as general manager of the Santa Fe.

The old system of maintaining a grand division under the jurisdiction of a general superintendent has been abolished. A grand division is now an obsolete term in Santa Fe parlance.

To take the place of the grand divisions the Santa Fe has created districts, each of which will be composed of several divisions.

The eastern section of the Santa Fe has been divided into two districts, known as the eastern and western district.

F. C. Fox, a former division superintendent in Las Vegas, who for the past four years has been general superintendent of the eastern grand division with headquarters at Topeka, has been appointed general superintendent of the eastern district, which comprises the Eastern, Kansas City, Missouri, and Illinois divisions. His headquarters will remain in Topeka.

H. W. Sharp, who has been general superintendent of the western grand division at La Junta, Colo., has been appointed general superintendent of the western district with headquarters at Newton, Kan. His district will comprise the middle, southern Kansas and Oklahoma divisions.

The western section of the Santa Fe, of which C. W. Kouns is general manager, has also been divided and two general superintendents will have charge of the two newly created districts.

R. J. Parker, who has been general superintendent of the central grand division with headquarters at Newton, has been transferred to La Junta, where he will have charge of one of the districts. Avery Turner, who has been vice president and general manager of the Eastern railway of New Mexico, becomes general superintendent of the other district, with headquarters at Amarillo, Texas.

Other changes in the engineering and other departments to conform with the new operating system, will likely be made within a short time.

Mrs. Walls and son, Ed, visited at Fairview ranch Sunday afternoon.


We had a fine snow in this part of the country Monday night. Would have liked more but did not have our say about it.
