TECHNICAL EXAMINATION

On the 21st of April there will be examinations in the local office of the United States civil service commission and elsewhere for the following positions: Assistant physicist, assistant chemist and assistant photographer. For the position of physicist the applicant must be a college or technical school graduate or must show that he has done work equivalent to that required for securing one of these degrees. The examination will cover only the subjects of physics and mathematics and the employment of the successful applicants will be in the bureau of standards. The salary is from \$1400 to \$1800 per annum. The work of the assistant chemist will be in the same bureau as that of the physicist. Chemistry is the principal subject covered in the examination. The salary is the same as that of the physicist. The salary of assistant photographer will be from \$900 to \$1200 per annum and the examination will cover the technique of photography.
