

INAUGURATION OF U. P. SERVICE MAY BRING ABOUT SPEED WAR

The new Union Pacific-Wabash train service between St. Louis and Denver will be inaugurated on May 2. The details have all been completed and the schedule made out. Two hours and forty-five minutes will be cut from the present time schedule between the two cities.

The new train westbound will leave St. Louis at 2:30 o'clock each afternoon and arrive at Kansas City at 9:55 p. m. It will leave Kansas City at 11:15 p. m. and arrive at Denver at 5:20 p. m. the next day.

East bound train will leave Denver at 12 o'clock noon, and arrive at Kansas City at 8:05 o'clock a. m. It will leave Kansas City at 9:05 a. m., and arrive at St. Louis at 5:45 p. m. The train will connect at Denver with the Union Pacific for the coast, carrying through cars.

It is expected that special exercises of some kind will take place upon the inauguration of the new service.

The time between St. Louis and Denver will be made in 26 hours and 50 minutes. The fastest schedule at present is 29 hours and 55 minutes, made by the Burlington. The Burlington is preparing to revise its schedules and several hours will probably be clipped from the time. There is a strong belief that a speed war may result.

TAX DISTRIBUTION IN THE TERRITORY

Territorial Auditor W. G. Sargent at Santa Fe has calculated the amount to be derived from the tax levy of 14.45 mills on the dollar announced as the levy for the territory on all taxable property. Last year the levy was 13 mills and the year before 14 mills. The increase is caused by the levy for the road fund, and the increase for the different territorial institutions. It is calculated that each mill will bring a revenue of \$40,000, the total assessment last year having been \$56,000,000, from which, however, the exemptions of about \$3,000,000 have to be deducted. It is probable that the taxable assessment will reach \$60,000,000 and over this year and that each mill may produce \$50,000 or more, in which case the levy next year can be materially reduced. The following are the amounts needed to run the territory during the next fiscal year:

- Interest on bonded debt, \$30,000.
 - Penitentiary fund \$63,360.
 - Armory certificates of indebtedness and interest \$11,013.33.
 - Deficiency certificates and interest \$10,892.47.
 - Miscellaneous fund \$38,800.
 - Capitol contingent expenses \$21,300.
 - Salary fund \$103,350.
 - Militia fund \$12,330.
 - Territorial library \$1,800.
 - Supreme court fund \$700.
 - Territorial institutions \$267,500.
 - Charitable institutions \$22,000.
- The levy is divided as follows: Territorial purposes 6 mills; territorial institutions 6.75 mills; road fund 1 mill; charitable institutions 0.6 of a mill; capitol rebuilding bond sinking fund 0.605 of a mill; insane asylum building sinking fund 0.005 of a mill.


