

EXISTING VACANCIES IN THE FOREST SERVICE

The United States civil service commission announces an examination on June 16, 1909, at East Las Vegas, to secure eligibles from which to make certification to fill existing vacancies, at \$900 per annum, in the position of clerk in the forest service, and vacancies requiring similar qualifications as they may occur at salaries of \$900 to \$1,200 per annum, depending upon conditions of service and location.

Eligibles will be subject to appointment for service in forest supervisors' offices at various points throughout the west. In a few places, owing to local conditions, the appointment of male clerks only can be considered. Many of the places of employment are desirable from a residence point of view.

The forest service does not furnish either houses or subsistence. Applicants will be expected to report at places of employment at their own expense. The duties to be performed consist of carrying on office correspondence, keeping up files, and conducting routine business during the absence of the forest supervisor in the field. It is especially desired to secure the services of men for a number of these positions.
