Washington, June 22. — Attorney General Wickersham today laid before President Taft and the cabinet a rough draft of a tariff bill amendment, which provides for the imposition of a two percent tax on the net earnings of corporations. The various points of the law were discussed at the meeting.

### Models' Earnings.

Nowadays all the leading firms of modistes employ living models. A good model can earn five to six pounds a week, the minimum wage for a "show lady" being two pounds a week. There are some models in London who are paid as much as £15 a week, and in Paris the salary of a good model in some of the best establishments runs to £12 a week. As long as a model is young and attractive her position as such is secure enough, and often very well paid, but at 30, and sometimes before, she is generally regarded as too old for the particular work required of her—that is, showing the effect of dresses when made; but if she has acquired a good knowledge of a modiste's business she is almost certain to obtain further and far more permanent employment with her own firm or else where.—London Tit-Bits.

### Milk an Intoxicant.
