## COUNTY TAX LEVY

(Continued From Page 1.)

There are a total of 72 school districts in San Miguel county. Under a statute enacted by the territorial legislature no school precinct will be allowed to participate in the general school levy unless it makes a special levy on the property in the precinct and certifies the same to the board of county commissioners. So far less than one-third of the county school precincts have made this necessary levy, or about twenty.

The total product of the levy in School District No. 2, comprising East Las Vegas, is approximately \$16,000. In School Districts Nos. 1 and 4, West Las Vegas, the levy is 15 mills each.  
The general and special levy in the city of Las Vegas is 13.50 mills, that is 10 mills for city purposes and 5.5 mills for the purpose of raising funds to pay the interest on the bonded debt.

The total tax rate for 1909 in Precinct No. 29 is \$6.72 on every \$100, while in 1908 it was \$6.48, but this increase, as has above been stated, is due to an increase in the territorial tax levy from 13 mills in 1908 to 14.45 mills in 1909.
