## PEARY AT BATTLE HARBOR

(Continued From Page 1.)

lowing details of Peary's journey to the north pole were gleaned from a member of the expedition:

"The only men to reach the pole were Peary and one Eskimo named Eging Wah. The other white members of the party, which left Cape Columbia, were sent back one by one as Peary drew nearer to his objective point. Matthew Hanson, his negro body servant, left last March for the south pole.

Capt. Bartlett and George Bourap started for Cape Columbia February 27, Peary leaving March 1 with seven white men, seventeen Eskimos and 136 dogs. Peary overtaking Bartlett, was forced to wait until March 11 on account of open water. His first observation of the sun was on March 5, when the explorer was at the 84th parallel. The party here narrowed down to Peary, Bartlett, Hanson and Eskimos and sixty dogs. Bartlett took the observations from the 88th parallel and returned, Peary, Hanson and three Eskimos making the final dash for the pole. The pole was reached on April 6. Peary remained there thirty-four hours depositing records, taking observations and hoisting the U. S. flag. Returning, he reached the Roosevelt on April 27.
