DRY FARMER MAKES \$2,000 OFF HOMESTEAD

That dry farming is a success is shown by the following evidence: William Heckroth, who located a homestead nine miles southwest of Wagon Mound, just finished thrashing 225 bushels of millet from ten acres of land, and the same is worth \$2.00 per bushel. He has 50 acres of beans which will average 1000 lbs. per acre, and for which he has a standing offer of 4 cents per pound, thus the same nets him \$2,000. Besides this he has the straw left from his millet for feed and also has other small crops, so that he will obtain net over \$2,000 from this homestead ranch the first year.
