ches thick and between the cars were big snow drifts. The train today ran on schedule time which would indicate that the storm had abated to some extent.

Conductor Hetzler and crew handled train No. 705, the local, out of Las Vegas yesterday morning on account of the regular crew, Conductor Stuart and assistants, being sent out with a rush coal train to be distributed out of Albuquerque.

Fireman Frank Connell who has been in El Paso for the past few days, being summoned to that city to appear as a witness in court, has returned from the Pass city and has again reported for duty on engine No. 1220 relieving Fireman L. D. Dickerson.

J. F. Blahut who has been employed at the local shops as machinist helper has entered upon a new field of duty and will try for the road service as locomotive fireman. He is now going over the road between Las Vegas and Albuquerque making his student trips.

Conductor A. P. Gatchell was seen on the streets of Las Vegas yesterday during the stay of train No. 1 in the city. Mr. Gatchell who is well known in Las Vegas was enroute to his home in Santa Fe from an extended visit to Denver and other Colorado points.

Fireman J. W. Jackson was compelled to lay off in Albuquerque Tuesday on account of being tied up under the 16 hour law. He was relieved by Fireman L. Cummings of the Coast lines who handled the duties as scoop artist on engine No. 1214 into this place Tuesday returning to the Duke city that same night on engine No. 1465.

Conductor Swallow and crew handled No. 3 out of this place last night. He had as a crew brakeman Goodrich and brakeman Pierce Murphy, the only available brakemen to make up a crew. Shortage of men continues at this point and the crews are constantly doubling over the road or are tied up under the 16 hour law. Business over the New Mexico division of the Santa Fe system continues heavy both in the freight and passenger traffic.



Mr. Harris was accompanied by his wife and son. The party was enroute to Pasadena, Calif., where Mr. Harris owns a beautiful home which he occupies two months out of each year in the sunny climate of southern California. Mrs. Harris visited Las Vegas many years ago and for several years was a summer guest at the Montezuma hotel at the Hot Springs when that institution was running. She inquired about many of her former acquaintances in Las Vegas, many of whom are now residing in other cities. Mrs. Harris is personally acquainted with M. R. Otero of Santa Fe.

Owing to the shortage of locomotive engineers at this point it has become necessary to call an examination of firemen who are to be advanced to the position of engineers. M. Ackerman has been assigned to engine No. 1606; Fireman Thomas Chohan, engine No. 1607; Fireman J. B. Merritt, engine No. 1619; Fireman Frank Snelling, engine No. 1654; Fireman H. A. Harvey, engine No. 1603.
