BURGLARS OPERATED ALSO IN ALBUQUERQUE

TWO NEGRO CROOKS WHO PULLED OFF GREENBERGER ROBBERY, WANTED THERE

Chief of Police Ben Coles has received a letter from Chief Thomas McMillin of Albuquerque which brings additional information concerning the crime for which Joseph Kelly and Charles Crawford, the negroes who yesterday confessed to the burglary of the Greenberger store, are wanted in Albuquerque. On the night of April 21, last, burglars entered the store of Slegfred Kahn in Albuquerque and stole jewelry to the value of \$300. Kelly and Crawford were in Albuquerque at that time with the carnival company, which gave a street fair for the Beavers. It is believed they are the men who robbed the store.

Chief McMillin desired to send an officer here to take charge of the men and remove them to Albuquerque, but when he learned they had been arrested for a burglary committed here, he abandoned his plan. The Albuquerque chief, however, will send for Kelly and Crawford should they escape punishment here.

The Kahn store was burglarized in much the same manner as the Greenberger store. The robbers entered through a skylight. In Albuquerque, however, they waited until the Friday evening in carnival week before pulling off the job. It is believed the arrest of Kelly and Crawford has convinced any other toughs who may be hanging along in the wake of the show that the police can make it decidedly unpleasant for them if they attempt to operate here.

OTTO E. FIEL IS CLAIMED BY DEATH

END CAME YESTERDAY IN PHOENIX, ARIZ., TO FORMER LAS VEGAS YOUNG MAN

Word was received here this morning by D. W. Condon, secretary of Las Vegas Lodge No. 408, B. P. O. Elks, that Otto E. Fiel, a member of the lodge, died yesterday in Phoenix, Ariz., where he went several months ago for the benefit of his health. Mr. Fiel resided in Las Vegas several years and had a large number of warm personal friends. He was 26 years of age.

Until last December, when he was obliged to quit work on account of falling health, Mr. Fiel was chief deputy to Lorenzo Delgado, clerk of the probate court. He occupied that position for a year with great credit to himself. Always painstaking and exact, Mr. Fiel made himself an invaluable aid to Mr. Delgado.

Before his work at the court house began Mr. Fiel was employed in a clerical position by the Santa Fe railway. Several years ago he attended the Normal University where he established a reputation as a baseball player and athlete. Mr. Fiel's health had been declining for several months. With his mother, he went to Phoenix in December, hoping the lower altitude and warm temperature would prove beneficial. News of his death will be a shock to his friends.

Mr. Fiel was a Mason as well as an Elk. He took the degree of the Scottish Rite in Santa Fe with a large class last fall. Burial will take place in Joliet, Ill., Mr. Fiel's former home. Accompanied by the mother and step-father, the body will pass through Las Vegas tomorrow.

MISS BACA'S FUNERAL LARGELY ATTENDED

FRIENDS YESTERDAY PAID LOVING TRIBUTE TO MEMORY OF YOUNG WOMAN

The funeral of Miss Lola C. de Baca, who died Wednesday morning, was held yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock from the home of the young woman's father, Francisco C. de Baca, on the Boulevard. A large number of the friends of the family were present and many beautiful floral pieces and cut flowers covered the casket. Rev. Father Paul Gilbertson conducted the services. Miss Baca was 25 years of age. Her character was beautiful and she had many friends. She is survived by her father and four brothers, Hipolito C. de Baca, of the Romero Mercantile company, Pablo C. de Baca, Eugenio C. de Baca and Arsenio C. de Baca. Miss Baca had been ill for eight months and her death was not unexpected, but it brought a severe shock to her friends and relatives.

NEGROES ALL ROUND CROOKS

Additional evidence that Kelly and Crawford, the two negroes charged with robbing the Greenberger store early Wednesday morning, were the men who burglarized the Kahn store in Albuquerque was secured today by Chief of Police Ben Coles. Coles today found in the room on Railroad avenue occupied by Kelly and Crawford, two suit cases that he recognized as those stolen in Albuquerque by the description given him by the Albuquerque police. Four suits sold to Eugenio Rudolph and some jewelry recovered from the negroes also have been identified as Albuquerque goods.

Two new faces will be seen in the line-up of the Maroons when they stack up against the Railroaders at Amusement park Sunday afternoon. The "mugs" belong to "Bug" Edmunds and "Swede" Ekberg, a pitcher and first baseman. Edmunds is on the reserve list of the Denver Western league club. CORN GROWING CONTESTS FOR NEW MEXICO

AGRICULTURE COLLEGE MAKES ANNOUNCEMENT OF PRIZES FOR VARIOUS COUNTIES

If the boys of San Miguel county are sufficiently desirous of entering a corn growing contest this year the New Mexico Agricultural and Mechanical college of Mesilla Park likely will arrange to give handsome prizes to the successful contestants. The school has issued a bulletin concerning a contest to be held in Dona Ana county. It has also stated that while it cannot conduct such contests all over the territory, it will be willing to furnish farmers' institutes and county superintendents with seed and literature on corn growing. If any farmer's institute will organize a contest the college will co-operate and furnish part of the prizes.

In some instances it will do better than that. If a sufficient number of boys under 18 years of age will write and assert their willingness to enter the contest the college will arrange to conduct such a test under the direction of the extension department.

Corn growing contests are being participated in by boys in all parts of the United States. Jerry Moore of Winona, S. C., holds the record as champion grower, having raised 288 bushels per acre at a cost of 33 cents a bushel. Steve Henry of Louisiana, is the most economical corn grower, having expended but 13 cents per bushel in raising 140 bushels of corn. The corn growing contests furnish the boys of New Mexico some valuable experience and test the soil and climate of the localities in which they live. These tests should prove of value to the farmers and bureau of immigration.

PASTOR CHANGES JOB TO SEE BETTER BALL


REV. HOMER D. HENDERSON OF ST. LOUIS GOING TO DETROIT
