## GOVERNOR TO BE ASKED TO ISSUE PROCLAMATION

### GOOD ROADS DAY BOOSTERS WANT EXECUTIVE ENDORSEMENT OF PLAN AND WILL URGE THAT STEP AT ONCE

Good Roads day, although it has taken over a large portion of the state, still lacks executive approbation and endorsement. To remedy this the boosters who have been planning the project will request Governor W. C. McDonald, at an early date, to endorse the scheme.

With that endorsement the plan will be in condition to be pushed ahead to the limit. The request for endorsement will be forwarded to the governor within a few days and he is expected to take action upon it within a few more, so that by the end of the week it is likely the boosters will have one more argument for convincing the faint hearted.

The local committees which have been named are going ahead with their work in a hustling way and preparations for the big event will all be carried out according to schedule.

Sentiment in favor of the proposition is growing daily, almost hourly, in fact, and from all indications it is going to be a vast success.

Colorado followed the lead of New Mexico yesterday and will hold a similar day some time next month. There is every reason to expect success and none for discouragement. Dr. W. T. Brown of Valmore, boss booster in charge of the affair, is back from a necessary business trip north and will immediately lend his support to the cause. He expects to make several trips along the Santa Fe trail urging work to be done and will doubtless accomplish much good for the cause.

Albuquerque has selected a stretch of road to be worked and will turn out nearly 1,000 men, perhaps more, on the roads on September 10. Other towns along the line are giving the project encouragement of the heartiest sort and everything points to success for it.

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## FOUR SCHOOLS TO BE ERECTED IN SAN MIGUEL

### CONDITIONS IN THREE DISTRICTS WARRANT ISSUE OF BONDS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF NEW AND MODERN BUILDINGS.

Four new schoolhouses will be erected and ready for use by the first of the year in present plans are carried out as expected. These school houses will be in widely separated districts. All will be of the most modern construction and up-to-date in every particular. Wood, stone and bricks will be used as will stucco, in their construction, the type varying with the location of the schools.

Two of the new building are to go in the Los Alamos district where the increase in population has developed a need for more school facilities. This is district No. 10.

District No. 21, Pecos town, is to have a new building also.

West Pecos, District No. 97, completes the quartet. The bond issue proposed in this district for the new school house is \$1,500. That at Pecos town is \$2,500 while the Los Alamos district proposes a bond issue of \$5,000.

All the bond issues are being advertised at present and the funds will no doubt be available soon.
