

# Telegraphic News.

**NEW YORK, April 9.**—A dispatch from the *World*, from Madrid, says that the Ambassadors of France, Germany, Russia, Italy and Austria have diplomatically informed the government of Spain that a war with the United States can be avoided, in their judgment, only by Spain yielding to the demands of this country. They said, in effect, that if the Queen should make such concessions as they believed necessary, the powers of Europe would guarantee her against war, both external and internal. This means that Austrian troops would, if necessary, be sent to Spain to suppress a civil war.

**LANSING, Mich., April 9.**—Governor Pingree today sent a message to the legislature, recommending the authorization of a war loan of \$500,000, also advising the recruiting of national guard and volunteer militia companies, to a strength not exceeding 150 men per company. A scene of enthusiasm followed the reading in the House, and the loan bill was passed with in half an hour.

**WASHINGTON, April 9.**—The Senate Committee on Foreign Relations will practically make its declaration for intervention in Cuba only if the President represents the necessity for thus limiting the official action of this country. The members of the committee who are now expected to support the President are Frye, Cullum, Lodge, Clark, Gray, Daniel.

**WASHINGTON, April 9.**—The steering committee of the House Republicans had a long conference with Senator Davis, Chairman of Foreign Relations Committee of the Senate, regarding the legal phases involved in the question of intervention and recognition. At the conclusion the members declined to state what occurred.

**WASHINGTON, April 9.**—Permission has been given by the State department to the United States consuls in Spain to leave that country if they so desire, pending the threatened severance of diplomatic relations, between Spain and this country. They have not been ordered to leave but are permitted to exercise their own discretion.

**WASHINGTON, April 9.**—Secretary Sherman at 2:45 this afternoon had received no word from Consul General Lee that he had left Havana. The Secretary expected to hear at any time. Neither the State department nor the Spanish minister had received word from Madrid that Spain had declared an armistice.

**WILMINGTON, Del., April 9.**—E. I. Dupont and the De Nemours company, it is understood, received from the United States government a contract for furnishing \$15,000,000 worth of powder and their mills are being rushed to turn out material as rapidly as possible.

**RIO JANEIRO, Brazil, April 9.**—The government has sold the cruiser "Niteroy" to the United States for \$550,000.

**HONG KONG, China, April 9.**—The United States have purchased the British steamer "Zadro."

**WASHINGTON, April 9.**—The Navy department officials discredit widely the circulated rumors that the "Fern" has been blown up at Havana.

**MADRID, April 9.**—Elections will be held throughout the kingdom tomorrow for the renewal of half the membership of the senate. According to the Spanish constitution of 1876 there are three classes of senators. The first consists of the king's sons and the sons of their apparent, who have reached their majority, of grandees, captains general, admirals, church dignitaries and other officials. The second class is composed of members appointed by the crown for life. The third class, 180 senators, comprises those elected by the corporations of the realm, the church, the universities, the academies, the communal and provincial states and the largest payers of contributions. Very little interest is manifested in tomorrow's election, as it means nothing more than an indorsement of the members of the third class who sat in the last senate before the recent dissolution following the downfall of the Canovas cabinet, the constitution requiring that all elective senators must be re-elected in case of a dissolution.

**MADRID, April 9.**—A political society, with French alliances, has drafted an address to the government declaring that the United States desire to impair Spain's indisputable sovereignty over Cuba and Porto Rico, and asserting that these islands are keys to the Gulf of Mexico, and claiming it must be Spain's mission to retain them as a guarantee for the maintenance of the commercial interests of Europe.

**CAIRO, Egypt, April 9.**—The British brigade which engaged in the defeat of the Dervishes, yesterday, at Aibara, captured Mahmoud, the Dervish commander and 6,000 of his followers, had two officers and ten men killed and ninety wounded. The Egyptians lost fifty-one men killed, fourteen officers and 319 men wounded. The Dervishes lost about 2,000 men killed.

**RICHMOND, Va., April 9.**—Prominent Confederate veterans and members of the Daughters of the Confederacy will join tomorrow in participating in the impressive ceremonies attending the unveiling of the magnificent stained glass window which has been placed in St. Paul's Episcopal church, in memory of Jefferson Davis.

**KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 9.**—The *Star* prints a report of the distribution of supplies and money sent by it to Matanzas, Cuba, and tells how its representatives were maltreated by the enraged Spaniards and finally driven away. The facts will be laid before the State department today.

**KNOXVILLE, Tenn., April 9.**—John McGhee and son Joe, shot and killed Henry and Ernest Howard and James Murrand, and mortally wounded Tom Howard. The killing was a result of a family feud. The McGhees are highly connected.

**VIENNA, April 9.**—In court circles it is believed that Queen Regent Christina may soon return to her native home. Suitable preparations are already making at the palace of her brother, the Archduke Eugen.

**MADRID, April 9.**—The political situation is unchanged. The opinions expressed by the newspapers are contradictory. Some hold the war is inevitable, others hope for peace.

**CHICAGO, April 9.**—The remains of Miss Frances E. Willard were cremated today, in accordance with her wishes.

Frank Banyan, of Charleston, Ind., was here and noted that all indications pointed to the fact that it is the season of the gentle springtime.
