Among the females, 32 are safe in calf, the majority of which are in expectancy to calve 29th, whose undefeated yearling record of 1897 at the leading state fairs has in all probability no superior in American show ring Whiteface history. The next in rank for the prospective calf crop is Monitor, who will also be out on sale day, for the inspection of all visitors.

This herd was comparatively unknown outside of the state prior to the first annual sale of April, 1897, and such was the success of the sale that every Hereford breeder in attendance was favorably impressed, and such is the improvement that will be shown at the coming sale that no one need feel like deserting his Hereford choice of the best of beef breeds.
