

## EDUCATIONAL INTERESTS.

Meeting of the New Mexico Association at Las Vegas in December—Notes from the Schools.

The steam was turned on for the first time in the new Normal school building last Thursday. It seems to be a success.

Professors Wood and Stockman's school has had quite an increase in numbers during the past few days. Others are expecting to enroll as soon as they can arrange to do so. Pupils of this school seem to be getting along very pleasantly and advancing quite rapidly. Among the pictures on the walls of the school room are to be seen engravings of W. C. Bryant, Phillips Brooks, Oliver Wendell Holmes, J. G. Whittier and Lowell.

Nearly all the pupils of the Normal, both boys and girls, have joined the Athletic club. The initiation fee is fifty cents and the dues ten cents each month during the year. They have already had a few games of basket ball which is a modification of foot ball, and a much wilder game. The faculty and students have the use of grounds near the Sanitarium which they are leveling off and which they expect to enclose with a board fence.

This past year the association, through its committee, has had 2,000 copies of a course of study for the public schools of the Territory published. This is a very neat pamphlet of some fifty pages. Many of the leading schools of New Mexico are now using it. Shipments have been made to Raton, Santa Fe, Cerrillos, Albuquerque, Gallup, Silver City, Deming, White Oaks and Roswell. East Las Vegas took 500 copies and had the rules and regulations of the city schools bound with them. Copies of the course of study may be had at five cents a copy by addressing J. A. Wood, East Las Vegas, who has had in charge the printing and mailing of the course of study, as the work was done at THE OPTIC publishing company's office.

It has been arranged to hold the next annual meeting of the Educational Association of New Mexico in the chapel of the Normal school building, on the 27th, 28th and 29th of December. This promises to be a very important meeting for the educational interests of the Territory. An effort is being made to have all the leading educators of New Mexico present and to take some active part in the meeting. President Jordan of the Agricultural college at Mesilla Park, Prof. A. E. Bennet of the Silver City Normal school, and Prof. J. A. Wood of the Las Vegas Business college, constitute the executive committee to arrange the program, and to arrange for the meeting generally. Any one desiring to know more concerning the meeting is invited to address any one of the executive committee. The people of Las Vegas should take a lively interest in this meeting as it may mean a great deal for the educational interests of this city and county.

## E-TOWN GOLD FIND.

Five Feet of Gold Bearing Quartz Struck in the Deepest Shaft in Camp.

John Doyle, a well known practical mining man in the Elizabethtown district, has been in the city for several days and brings cheering reports of the Mills Tunnel company's properties. Mr. Doyle has just completed a heavy contract for this company and his special mission here was to bring samples and assay certificates relating to a new and rich find which he has started in the shaft on the New Moon claim, a property adjoining the famous Red Bandana gold producer. The shaft is down 157 feet and is in good ore. As yet neither wall has been encountered and there is exposed five feet of pure white quartz that assays \$13 to the ton in gold. This is by at least 75 feet the deepest workings in the E-Town district and the discovery is all the more important in that it shows what deep mining promises to do for this rich mining section. Mr. Doyle left for camp today after having made a new contract with the Mills Tunnel directors for forty feet more of work, which will consist of drifting on and cross-cutting the vein in order to prove the full value and extent of the new find.


