## TERRITORIAL TOPICS.

### ALAMOGORDO NOTES.

Sixty timber men from Pennsylvania arrived here Monday to work in the timber of the Sacramento mountains getting out logs for the Alamogordo Lumber company.

The big saw mill has started up and is now working nicely sawing Sacramento mountain timber into first-class lumber at the rate of about one hundred thousand feet per day; 150 men are at work.

The editor of the Sacramento Chief will leave December 6th, for Fort Worth, to attend the Farmers' National Congress. During his absence the paper will be in charge of Will N. Rogers and Arthur G. Barlingame.

Will Coe, of Newman canon, is the champion potato raiser, so far recorded at this office for the present year. One potato from Mr. Coe's ranch weighs four and one-half pounds; a number weigh two pounds.

Governor L. A. Waters, J. Wilks Hollenbeck and Dr. Taylor, all of Wilk barre, Pa., accompanied by their wives and three lady friends, came in Tuesday on C. B. Eddy's private car, "El Paso del Norte." Messrs. Waters and Hollenbeck are heavy stockholders in all the different enterprises of the railroad company here.

### SANTA FE EXTRACTIONS

The first Raymond & Whitcomb excursion of the season arrived early Sunday morning with 35 people, mostly from New England.

Captain W. H. W. James, 14th infantry, who was stationed in this city for two years on duty with the national guard of the Territory, is now stationed at Fort Logan, near Denver.

Two boys who had been quarantined Saturday night on the south side disobeyed the orders of the health officer and went down town. They were corraled by Dick Huber and dropped into the county jail where their agonizing howls were heard for a block. Those boys will obey orders now.

Santa Fe was struck by a howling gale late Sunday afternoon, and the city was enveloped first in tremendous clouds of dust that broke the hearts of all the tidy housekeepers in town. This was followed by a fierce snow storm. However, the "beautiful" did

not last very long, and, although it cleared off cold, there is no sleighing.

### ALBUQUERQUE ATOMS.

Shepherd Crumpacker, one of the pioneers of La Porte county, Ind., and the father of Judge Johnathan W. Crumpacker, of the federal court of New Mexico, died suddenly at Westville, Ind., on the 16th inst. Death was caused by heart disease, with which he had been afflicted for a number of years. He was born near Lynchburg, Va., July 17, 1824.

### WAR ON TRUSTS.

In the war being made on the Tobacco trust by the independent companies considerable aggressive power is shown. There is likewise a remarkable grasp of agencies whose unified hostilities make for success in a fight of this kind.

The labor unions and granger societies of the country are being negotiated with to form an alliance with the independent companies. A number of dealers in tobacco in various states will be asked to affiliate with the opposition movement. Their share in the general plan will be to refuse to use any of the trust's product.

The most serious and telling form of anti-trust coalition is being crystallized among the tobacco growers. Meetings have been held in tobacco growing centers of some of the states and others have been called. The object of these meetings is to arrange a concert of action among as many tobacco raisers as possible to resist the encroachment of the trust by refusing to sell their products to its agents.

Another feature of the war is a movement in several states to bring pressure upon the legislatures to pass sweeping anti-trust bills and also to fight the trust wherever possible in the courts.

Public sympathy and public interest should be behind any movement that has for its end the abolition of every form of trust. Trusts are unlawful combinations in restraint of trade. They reduce, by destroying competition, producers and consumers to commercial helplessness and servitude.

By reason of the consolidation of vast sums of money in few hands they corrupt legislation and carry on their arbitrary operations unhindered by legal restraint. Laws against them remain imperative on the statute books because those entrusted with their execution fear the hostility of the trusts in politics.

The federal government, adds the St. Louis Republic, has an anti-trust law that has just been declared constitutional and operative by the supreme court. But the Republican attorney general intrusted with its enforcement is an ex-trust lawyer from the breeding ground and nursery of trusts—New Jersey. He represents the department of justice in the cabinet of a President who was elected by the trusts and the interests they dominate. If he prosecuted the trusts he would be attacking his political bread and meat—the sinews of war of his party.

### KEDSIE AFTER THEM.

Don Kedsie waxes warm under the collar, and in his Lordsburg Liberal, thus lays out the people of Arizona, evidently to his own satisfaction:

The defeat of Col. Brodie of the Rough Riders, for delegate to congress, by a Jim-crow lawyer who cannot address a public audience five minutes without stopping to spit on the platform, and the defeat of Captain J. H. McClintock, another Rough Rider, who was a candidate for the Territorial council, by a Shoney second hand clothes dealer of Phoenix, indicates that the people of Arizona are not sufficiently advanced in patriotism to be entitled to admission as a state. The Territory should not be admitted until the present generation of voters is dead and buried.
