ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF ABBEY MINING COMPANY.

Glorieta Hill Mast Go.

The New Mexican has reliable information that the survey of the proposed change in the main line of the Santa Fe railroad over Glorieta hill has been completed. The new line will be a little north of the present line and will be mostly along the side of the hill, high enough to be out of the reach of the floods of the Galisteo. In place of the present grade of four per cent a grade of one and a half per cent is to be secured by driving a tunnel one and one half miles in length through Glorieta hill. The east end of the tunnel will be at Pigeon's ranch.



Louis Huning, an old and respected citizen of New Mexico, died at his home in Los Lunas Tuesday night.

General Funston, the capturer of Aguinaldo, is coming home. A son was born to him in his Kansas home only a day or two ago.

Holiday week is being carefully observed at the White House. Only urgent business will be attended to by President Roosevelt.

A terrific storm of sleet and snow driven by a wind that was almost a hurricane swept over the extreme northwest on Christmas day.

Governor Shaw of Iowa has been offered the secretaryship of the treasury to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Secretary Gage.

The 125th anniversary of the battle of Trenton was celebrated Thursday at Trenton, N. J., by a sham battle and subsequent parade in the presence of large crowds of people.

Senator Chauncy M. Depew and Miss May Palmer were married by civil ceremony at Nice, Italy, yesterday. They will be further united by the Episcopal and the Catholic ceremonies today.

Grover Cleveland has accepted an important position on the national civic federation, the object of which is to settle disputes between labor and capital by conference between leaders.

Judge McMillan recently decided that the action of the territorial board of equalization in raising the rate of taxation on certain kinds of property throughout the territory was illegal. The territory will not appeal and the decision therefore stands as law.

Maclay, the writer of the so-called history in which he denounced Admiral Schley as a poltroon and a coward and thus brought about the inquiry just closed, has been discharged from his position of skilled laborer in the government navy yard at New York.
