is "quid sabel" which makes it necessary  
to hunt all over the city for an inter-  
preter before you can get water enough to  
cook dinner or ring out a dish-rag. Ev-  
erybody is getting all-fired tired of this  
"hocus pocus" way of doing business, and  
what the public now demand is that the  
city authorities adopt some system by  
which our citizens can have the benefit  
of the water privileges when they pay  
for it.
