1st Scandal.

Denver, Aug. 31.—A Chicago special to the News said: The following is the story referred to in the Mexican dispatch:

Chicago, Aug. 29.—The Times this morning prints the following special from the City of Mexico. Mr. S. G. Sedgwick, Secretary Bayard's special envoy to Mexico, has been here since Monday. He called upon Minister Jackson, to whom he explained he had been sent as a legal expert to look up the law and facts in the Cutting case, but presented no credentials. When he asked to be presented to Senator Mariscal, Mr. Jackson informed him that that could only be done on an order from Mr. Bayard, and Mr. Sedgwick was not presented. The Mexican press noted the arrival of Mr. Sedgwick, as representative of the United States, and at the same time announced that Sedgwick had unlimited credit at a banking house in this city. This announcement secured Mr. Sedgwick the attention of some of the young Mexican bloods, and he was invited to a dinner on Friday night by the Jockey Club. Sedgwick went there in regulation costume and enjoyed himself immensely. He soon became hilarious and made himself the leader of a crowd of admirers. He was on a mission of peace and good will toward Mexico, and beamed with peace and good will at every glass that was offered him by the crowd. Toward the small hours of the morning the special envoy's friends surrounded him and gave him assurances of their undying devotion. They decked him out with flowers and placed a big bouquet in the top of his hat. At about 6.15 o'clock the inmates of the Iturbide hotel were aroused by a noisy performance. There were some twenty or more of the Mexican bloods singing and shouting as they led, as in triumph, Mr. Sedgwick, the special envoy. "Viva el embajador Americano," they cried, and Sedgwick, decked out as a prince with a big long garland of evergreens, nodded his proud assent. The party then passed through several streets and also caroused in several houses of well known reputation, in one of which they finally abandoned their prize to the charge of some women. At 2 p. m. Sedgwick returned to his hotel, looking the worse for wear, but wearing a brand new hat. The escapade of the alleged special envoy is the talk of the town. The members of the American colony are full of indignation over the disgrace brought upon the American name by a man sent by Mr. Bayard on a delicate mission;

Assistant Post office Inspector Frederick returned from the south yesterday, after completing his examination into the charges that copies of the New Mexican Methodist, mailed to Manzano, were withheld from subscribers and destroyed by the postmaster, Rev. A. Gourbeyers, a Catholic priest. Mr. Frederick is of the opinion that there was no good foundation for the charge which has grown out of a bitter religious feeling, and has so reported to the department.—Democrat.

The designs for the panels in Garfield's monument at Cleveland are completed. They are five in number and represent typical incidents in his remarkable career. He is shown as an instructor, a soldier, and an orator in the first three of the series. The fourth design depicts him in the act of taking the oath of office as the president of the United States, surrounded by a group of notable men, among whom are Chief Justice Waite, Vice President Arthur, Gen. Sherman, Senator Logan, Senator Evarts, Senator Sherman, ex-Vice President Wheeler, and Mr. R. B. Hayes. The figures are life-size. The fifth panel represents the dead chief magistrate lying in state.

REDUCING ORES.

A new process in the treatment of ores, the invention of Mr. Bernard Malloy, of England, is attracting the attention of mining men all over the world just now. It is known and has been frequently spoken of as the "Hydrogen-Amalgam Process," for the treatment of gold and silver ores, when the metal is in a form that will amalgamate. Within the machine a quantity of hydrogen gas is set free, which is said to exert a beneficial reducing action upon the ore, and prevent a sickening or fouling of the quicksilver. The machine is so contrived mechanically that every particle of the ore is brought into contact with the quicksilver from 15 to 30 seconds. It occupies a space only three feet square, and has a capacity of four tons per day, and one man can tend to several of them. These are the claims made for it. If they are correct the invention is one of great value. Any machine which will do these things cheaply, as this one is said to do, will save millions of dollars that are now lost in tailings.

The London Mining Journal gives an account of the trial of the process in London on gold ores, and the result. Out of a red oxide of iron from Mexico, which contained much float gold and sickened quicksilver, 76 per cent was saved. A similar ore, which yielded nothing under the stamps, showed a saving of 57 per cent. An arsenical pyrites, from which only 20 per cent had previously been saved, gave up 65 per cent. A pyrites tailings yielding 87 per cent. A sulphide of antimony one of the worst ores possible to amalgamate, gave 86 per cent. A pyrites from India, from which the stamps had extracted only 20 per cent, yielded 97 per cent. The Journal says there was no waste of mercury, and the cost of working the machine was three pence, or 6 cents per ton, and that the process is at once extraordinarily successful, marvelously cheap and absolutely simple.—New Mexican.
