TELEGRAPHIC.

COLLISION.

London, July 21.—A collision occurred at Spithead Bay between the iron clads Ajax and Devastation. Both were considerably damaged and are leaking fast.

ENGLISH ELECTIONS.

London, July 21.—The cabinet met again to discuss the amendment bill offered by liberal unionists. The election in Basinstake division, Hampshire, to fill the vacancy caused by the elevation to peerage of G. Selkater Booth (conservative) elected, receiving 3,315 votes against 2,246 for Eve (liberal). Conservative votes shows a falling off of 600, and the liberal vote a gain of 100.

NATIONAL LEAGUE.

Cork, July 21.—Five hundred delegates and 150 priests attended the National League convention here yesterday. Wm. O'Brien presided. He said the object of the meeting was to organize a campaign for the assistance of tenants. Seven members of parliament from County Cork, John Dillon and other commissioners, were present. Resolutions were adopted in accordance with the object of the convention, as stated by Mr. O'Brien.

POLITICAL POINTS.

London, July 21.—Chamberlain was the principal agent in conducting the negotiations between the government and the unionists. The Post this morning reiterates its cry for unity among unionists. It says: A "curse of weakness will be apparent so long as Lord Salisbury is compelled to declare himself in the minority. A new appeal should be made to the unionists to take their places in the ministerial ranks."

The News says: Lord Salisbury had capitulated in terms that do honor to his cynical frankness. The government has betrayed the Irish landlords for the sake of union and office power. The Irish commission has reduced judicial rents which will be valid for two years, at the end of which time it is expected the purchase bill will be in operation. Howell has notified Fowler that he will call the attention of the house of commons to Fowler's conduct in calling him a "liar."

A GREAT DEMONSTRATION.

City of Mexico, via Galveston, July 21.—The anniversary of the death of President Juarez was observed with great enthusiasm yesterday. Hundreds of buildings displayed the Mexican colors draped with black, and many American flags were seen at half-mast. Thousands of persons lined the streets along the route of the procession to the cemetery of San Fernando where the artistic and beautiful tomb of the dead patriot stands. The procession was composed of civic societies of various sorts, school children, survivors of Juarez army and the federal troops. Along the line of march the procession was greeted with applause and cries of "Death to the priests!" were frequently heard, the populace taking the celebration to mean an anti-clerical demonstration. President Diaz and his cabinet proceeded early to the cemetery, the approaches to which were guarded by a regiment from the military academy at Chapultepec and the other troops serving as a guard of honor. Thousands of persons were admitted to the enclosure, but many persons were compelled to remain outside. The magnificent tomb of President Juarez was literally buried in flowers, fully a thousand wreaths being laid upon it, some of them coming from the most distant states. A band discoursed solemn music and addresses and poems were delivered. Amid the enthusiasm some of the speakers did not hesitate to attack the church party vehemently for the recent bitter attacks on Juarez, printed in conservative journals, the observance of which exalted in every particular all former commemorations. The exercises passed without trouble in any quarter, and the poli-

ticians of the liberal party regard it as a rebuke to the conservative party for attempting to disparage the great service of Juarez in resisting the establishment of imperial institutions in Mexico. Many American residents participated in the celebration, and the newspapers owned by Americans sent wreaths to be placed on the tomb, in token of their appreciation of the patriotism of the great Mexican statesman. The whole affair constituted one of the most spontaneous and remarkable patriotic demonstrations that has ever taken place here.

IT WILL BE PAID.

Berlin, July 21.—Dr. MacKenzie's bill for his services to the Crown Prince covering two visits to Germany and treatment in England, amounts to 2,625 pounds. The prince is rapidly recovering from his throat affection.

GLADSTONE'S OPINION.

London, July 21.—Mr. Gladstone, on receiving a copy of the political review, writes that it, like all other such reviews, shows that the liberals have carried nine-tenths of the beneficial laws on all great subjects. If the Tories had had their way there would have been revolution in England long ago. The unionists are laboring, Mr. Gladstone says in conclusion, however honestly and unconsciously to disunite the English and Irish people.

A DEPOSED OFFICIAL.

New York, July 21.—A Philadelphia special says that the provincial of the hermits of the order of St. Augustine in the United States has been formally deposed from his high office on grave and scandalous grounds, and a former provincial who it is alleged was defeated by crooked means at the last election has been appointed his successor. The deposed official is the Rev. John P. Gilmore, who apparently received a majority of one at the election by the chapter. It seems that this result was the work of an "ecclesiastical combine," and that Rev. C. A. McEvary, the former incumbent, and the friends of the latter caused an investigation to be made by the head of the order in Rome, and McEvary was given the position. Some of Gilmore's friends withdrew from the order, but matters are now quieting down.

A CRANK COMMUNITY.

Washington, July 21.—The local police commenting on the death of Kennedy, say that there are more cranks now in Washington, which is the mecca for cranks, than usual. The trouble is in the law or practice of committing persons to the insane asylum. Formerly this was done on a physician's certificate, now a jury trial is necessary. The result is that few are found insane. A noted physician reports the case of a dangerous lunatic in an old patient, now at large, who was often in the asylum under the old system, but whom a jury might not send there now.

This man, he says, is dangerous lunatic, going about possibly to wreck a madman, a revenge, some of these days, on some of the conspirators who he believes conspired to overturn the United States government and murder himself. Police officers say that they have noticed the increase of cranky persons, but they are powerless to act until the peace is disturbed. If any relative of an insane person out of an insane asylum, it is perfectly easy by employing a smart attorney to convince a member of any jury, composed of laymen, that the person is not insane.

Close upon the heels of a new earthquake at Baviac, came the details of a still greater calamity at Bacarac. It had, before the catastrophe, twelve hundred inhabitants. When Baviac was destroyed, Bacarac was badly shaken, and since then has been visited by a succession of shocks which reduced it to ruins, but most of the people escaped to the country, terror stricken.
