THE JUSTICE ACT.

Sections 1 and 2 of chapter 52 of the acts of the late legislature provide that all justices of the peace shall give a bond in the sum of five hundred dollars for the faithful performance of their official duties. Sections 3 and 4 legislate all failing to give bond out of office, and it is quite certain that there are very few justices of the peace legally authorized to act at the present time in this county. The following are the sections referred to:

Sec. 3. Every justice of the peace, now in office, shall execute and file the bond herein above required, on or before the first day of July, 1887.

Sec. 4. Every justice of the peace now in office, and every person who shall hereafter be elected or appointed justice of the peace, who shall fail to execute and file the bond as required in this act, within twenty days of the time as required in this act, and at the time required by law for entering upon his office, shall be, for such failure, deemed and held to have resigned his office, or to have refused to serve therein, and the office to be, by such failure, ipso facto, vacant; and the said office shall be filled by election or appointment, as required by law; and the party so failing to execute such bond, or qualify, as required by law, shall be ineligible to said office during the period of two years next thereafter.
