

WEST'S SHOTGUN.

Fired Two Shots at His Dusky Love.

He Missed and then Used His Fists and Mouth.

Important Letter from Denver & Rio Grande Official.

PROPOSITION RATHER PREMATURE.

Room 6, Commercial house on First street, was the scene of a shooting affair this morning at 10:45 o'clock that came very near proving fatal to one of Albuquerque's dusky maidens.

For some time Robert West, the tall and angular porter at Stripes' European, has been deeply in love with Miss Cline.

Another porter, named Al Stripland, at the Metropolitan saloon, was also a sweetheart of the Cline woman, and last night he, it seems, beat out the West fellow in her affections.

West, a warm southern blood, had become so hotly in love with the Cline girl that he had become a little unsteady in the head, and this morning with the green-eyed monster of jealousy, he secured a double-barreled shotgun, and, with this weapon furnished with soldier's creed, made his way to room 6. Standing in the hallway, peeping occasionally in the keyhole and hearing words of adoration echoing and re-echoing over the transom, West thought of his shotgun and

he mounted a trunk near the door and poked the barrel of the shotgun through the transom, firing a ball charge of deadly shot across the bed where Miss Cline was sitting up in bed, and he fired another shot this time so close that the deadly shot passed out of the open window, but not until they had discolored the knee of the woman's right leg and set fire to her nightgown.

At this stage of the game Lever No. 2, Stripland, hurriedly escaped from the room.

West, after firing the second shot, and finding the woman still a lively corpse, pointed upon her and gave her a sound beating, using his teeth to inflict a very severe wound on one of her fingers.

West then escaped from the room, while the woman was yelling "murder," and made a run for the street, credit to any well-known sprinter, Marshal McMillin, heard the shots, and on seeing the fleeing black man, he tied his legs also and sprinted at a top speed to get the fleeing would-be murderer. West, of course, was captured.

While this race was in progress, Police Martin and Deputy Sheriff Smith, scolding the smoke of powder, made themselves busy and after investigation started out after Stripland, who was seen near the corner of First and Second streets, and he was soon under arrest.

A preliminary hearing was had this afternoon at 3 o'clock before Justice Crawford and West was bound over to the next grand jury of this county to bonds of \$500, in default of which he was sent to the county jail. Stripland was turned loose.

To these letters the following answer was received this morning:

Denver, Col., May 28. My dear sir—I am just in receipt of yours of the 21st inst., and hasten to say that the rumors in regard to the extension of our line to the Coghiti are not very well founded. We, of course, take deep interest in the progress of all interests adjacent to the system of railway and from time to time cause investigations to be made as to the development that is going on and the out-

look for the future, but we have not formulated any definite plans nor has the matter been brought to the attention of our board of directors.

"Please present my compliments to the directors of your district and to them what I have heretofore written and thank them on my behalf for the friendly disposition they manifest toward the Denver & Rio Grande Railway company. I would not at this time advise any organized effort on the part of the Commercial club or the citizens of Albuquerque, but I do again express the hope that my business engagements will permit me to visit your city and thus redress a promise made several times in the last seven or eight years. COURT'S RECORD.

Judge Crumpacker Disposing of Cases.

A First-Class Record for this Judicial District.

Number of New Suits Filed in the District Court.

OTHER INTERESTING LOCAL NOTES.

At the close of the regular March term of the district court for Bernalillo county last week, Judge Crumpacker had thus far during the fiscal year which ends on June 30, 1900, disposed of an extraordinary number of business, the records showing that in final hearings and trials 400 cases have been irrevocably removed from the docket; and it is predicted that by the end of the fiscal year the total number of cases finally disposed of by trial and final hearing will have equalled, if not exceeded, the unprecedented number of cases disposed of by Judge Crumpacker during the last fiscal year ending June 30, 1899, the total number disposed of during that year having been close to 500. For the first time within the memory of the oldest member at the bar in this district, has the docket emptied to such an extent as to be larger. A comparison of business during the fiscal year 1899 taken from Gov. Otero's last report, shows that the volume of business disposed of in the district court of Bernalillo county alone was as great as all the business disposed of in the five counties of San Miguel, Colfax, Mora, Union and Guadalupe in the Fourth district, or three times as great as the entire volume of business disposed of in the district court of San Miguel county, which has Las Vegas as the county seat, during the same period; it shows that the business disposed of in the county seat of Bernalillo alone was greater than the entire volume of business disposed of in the entire Third district, of which Las Cruces is the county seat, and nearly twice as great as the entire volume of business disposed of in the entire Fifth district, of which Socorro is the county seat, during the same period. When it is known that the bringing of a case to trial or final hearing many motions and demurrers are heard and determined, it will be seen that Judge Crumpacker has been devoting extraordinary energies toward the court, and in meeting with success in wiping out the great number of cases which were allowed to accumulate under the present administration, and it is plainly to be seen here from that the judicial system of irrigation for reclaiming large tracts in the southern part of the territory, notably by the Elephant brand, but if the Stephens bill in this proposed irrigation project, which is selfish and exclusive benefit of Texas.

Feeling that the Stephens bill is unjust led to a mass meeting at Albuquerque on May 15, at which the governor appointed the committee on irrigation, which has promised to defer action on the bill until the committee can be heard.

The first bullet penetrated the heart of Patrio O'Hannon aged 3 years, which caused instant death, while the second bullet missed the neck of another child, aged 7. Upon seeing his deadly work Ruiz ran his escape, but was captured by the sheriff and his deputies. At the October term of court, a verdict of guilty was returned by the jury and the court sentenced the prisoner to death. Efforts have been made from time to time to secure a commutation but the decision of the court was never reversed and the law was allowed to take its course.

Did Not Weaken in the Trying Ordeal.

Said "Drink" was the Cause of his Terrible Crime.

A HANGING WITHOUT A HITCH.

Jose P. Ruiz, convicted of the murder of 3-year old Patrio O'Hannon, was hanged this morning in a one-story frame building near the county jail in old Albuquerque this morning. He was assisted to the platform by Rev. Father Persons, of the Catholic church and John Luero and spoke a few words in Spanish to the audience. Ruiz was of excellent quality. Montoya. Everyone present expected to see Ruiz weaken at the last moment, but he proved to be one of the bravest men that ever suffered the death penalty in the southwest. Deputy Sheriff E. C. Newcomer gave the signal to John Clark, a colored guard, and in an instant the body of Ruiz shot downward like an arrow. The drop fell and Ruiz was followed by the public, as Mr. McCooch will have more time to devote to the business.

MAJOR LLEWELLYN IN OMAHA. Famous Scout and Fighter Revisits His Old Nebraska Home.

Major W. H. H. Llewellyn of New Mexico, looking hardly a day older than he was a score of years ago, he rounded up his hands on the cattle range, had Indians off the reservation or broke in Omaha, dropped into this city this morning to rejoin his wife who has been visiting here, and to see his rural mail deliverer, Inspector of rural mail delivery.

Since he went to the territory Major Llewellyn has ruled unruly Apache, a speaker of the house of New Mexico, in which his second son, a corporal also, both fighting in Cuba, under Roosevelt, and is now member of the legislature and also territorial district attorney for the southern district.

At 4:40 o'clock this morning Deputy Sheriff Newcomer arrived at the jail and proceeded to Ruiz's cell. Ruiz and the priest were uttered fervent prayers. The prisoner walked to the cell door and his head bowed in prayer. The reading of the death warrant by the chief deputy, which was interpreted in Spanish by Nestor Montoya. Ruiz was dressed in a new black suit, new white shirt and congress shoes. After the reading of the death warrant, Ruiz put his hat on his head and assisted the jailer in adjusting the handcuffs. Then the procession to the gallows began.

Rev. Father Persons walked at the side of Ruiz and was followed by Deputy Sheriff Newcomer, Nestor Montoya and a press representative.
