

NEW MEXICO GOAL

The Mines Produce 1,359,530 Tons During Past Fiscal Year.

ONE-FIFTH MORE THAN PREVIOUS YEAR.

Jo E. Sheridan, the efficient United States mine inspector for New Mexico, has completed his annual report to Governor...

The production for the last fiscal year, ending June 30, 1903, was 1,359,530 tons, an increase of 19.99 per cent over the preceding fiscal year.

The production by counties is given below: Colfax county takes first place with a production of 558,865 tons; McKinley county is a close second with 539,916 tons; Lincoln county is third, 38,896 tons; Santa Fe county is fourth, 22,359 tons; Rio Arriba county is fifth, 25,190 tons; Socorro county is sixth, 29,460 tons; San Juan county is seventh, 1,800 tons.

Socorro county returns were only approximated as the principal coal operator of the county had not yet sent in his returns when the mine inspector closed his report. It is possible that the returns from Socorro county may be 25 per cent to 50 per cent larger than is given in the list of production.

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MINERAL EXHIBIT.

A Fine Display of Ores at the Exhibition Hall.

MANY DISTRICTS REPRESENTED.

The fair this year has a mineral exhibit surpassing all previous years. It shows what New Mexico has, but only needs development.

In the display yesterday, a Citizen reporter saw gold and copper ore, in Chacoite, typical gault rock, from the Cooney mine, Gold & Copper company, Mogollon, N. M. The ore carries 35 per cent of copper. There are other specimens from this district, some being Hornite, with 60 per cent of silver.

In the same display were argentine and pyrites carrying 296 ounces of silver and fifty ounces of gold. Other specimens claimed to be nearly solid chalcocite.

From the Las Placitas district, Santa Fe county, the Shamrock mine shows fine copper ore. Taos county is well represented. Numerous specimens show the values of the lead river district, including Copper Hill, Hornet, Inferno Tunnel, Victor, Mineral King.

Sandoval county shows sulphur, red and yellow ores, and other mineral points. The New Mexico Fuel & Iron company shows a fine display, one of its chief exhibits being Bloedite, a formation of soda.

No one can pass through Mineral Hall and not be impressed by the masses of gold, from Golden, N. M. The New Mexico Fuel & Iron company has a display of coal, which makes one warm only to look at it. The coal comes from Santa Fe county.

Bornite, silver and gold ore, from the Apache district, near Chloride, Sierra county, shows well. Peralta canyon, Cochiti, shows handsome gold ore. From the same district are specimens showing vanadium and the rare and valuable mineral which has been named radium.

The Ivanhoe mine at Peralta, shows ore which besides gold carries radium in a silicified volcanic breccia. The Joe Shelby mine, Red River district, Taos county, shows ore carrying from 75.00 to 478.00 per ton. Other specimens from this district, such as the Scherbert, carrying \$22 in gold per ton, while the Jayhawk beats the record with \$70 per ton.

The Colorado Fuel & Iron company shows an immense specimen of iron ore from Pierra, Grant county. Cochiti has a large exhibit. Cochiti county shows ore supposed to contain tin.

Rio Arriba county shows brittle silver, gold and silver ores, mica and other valuable minerals. The Carmel group of Tijeras canyon, as well as the Abo Pass and the Abo canyon make good exhibits.

The Jerome mine, Socorro county, makes a good display. Gray Eagle mine, near Lordsburg; Jones district, Oscura mountains; Lincoln county, are among the chief exhibitors of iron ore.

Rod Hematite from Rio Arriba county, carrying 69 per cent of iron; Las Placitas iron ore carrying 62 per cent, were among the chief exhibits. Cyanite crystals in mica schist are on display from Rio Arriba county.

Alabaster is displayed from the Jones mining district of Socorro county, and copper glance and carbonates from the Oscura mountains in the same county. Coal, manganese and gypsum are exhibited from the Cerrillos district; mineral paint from San Pedro; and onyx from other points in Santa Fe county.
