Cost Per Bale of Picking and Ginning Cotton

The cost of picking and ginning the 1931 cotton crop has been about \$2.75 per bale, according to report made by the cotton specialist of the Bureau of crop estimates, who gives estimates, by state, as follows: Virginia, \$2.40; North Carolina, \$2.17; South Carolina, \$2.05; Georgia, \$2.21; Florida, \$2.21; Alabama, \$2.20; Mississippi, \$2.47.

Louisiana, \$2.30; Texas, \$1.27; Arkansas, \$1.50; Tennessee, \$2.00; Missouri, \$1.89; Oklahoma, \$1.90; South Carolina, Georgia and Florida are included, \$4.16.—Monthly Crop Reporter.

NEW MEXICO DELEGATES FOR WOOD

Santa Fe, N. M., March 26.—New Mexican delegates to the national Republican convention tonight were instructed in haste for Major General Leonard Wood for the presidential nomination. Action of the convention came after a motion to endorse General Wood without instructions was voted down 100 to 80. The vote to instruct for General Wood was unanimous.

G. D. P. Nelson Praised. Resolutions were adopted commending the Republican members of the United States senate for their stand on the League of Nations and declaring the league means "the destruction of the constitution and of American sovereignty."

Emergency Urged. They also condemn what is termed the "attempted surrender of American independence and the substitution of an international system; urged economy in the expenditure of public money; condemned the "utter incompetence of the Democratic national administration as evidenced by extravagance" and urged reduction of taxation.

The convention endorsed the records of United States Senator A. B. Fall, Representatives D. S. Rice, and Governor Larrabee. H.

D. Dunsen was inducted for his final term as chairman.

Recess Is Taken. After listening to the keynote address of Gen. George W. Prentiss, temporary chairman, and addresses by Governor Larrabee and W. A. King, regional director of Kansas, the convention recessed from 2:30 to 7:30 o'clock to give the organization committee time to perfect the permanent organization of the convention.

Overconfidence Warning. The governor reviewed the achievements of the party and was loudly applauded. Regional Director of Finance W. A. King warned the party in his speech not to be overconfident. He said that the Democrats could raise a fund of \$50,000,000 if necessary and had control of enormous propaganda machinery which they would use to the limit.

Administrative Arrangements. A bitterly sarcastic exposition of the Democratic record of alleged intransigence and continuous hindering; a vitriolic attack on the League of Nations with the charge

that Article 3 binds America in "a web of strings" and indictment of the "blind stupidity" for his alleged "stupidity and stupidity" and a review of alleged Democratic extravagance were features of the surprise speech by Colonel Fryhite.

"While we rejoice over the fact our party has made," said the speaker, "we feel a large measure of sympathy commiserating the general occupant of the White House and his followers in the melancholy predicament of crawling from under the shattered fragments of an exploded peace pact."

Lojze Given Praised. General Prentiss declared that "this calamity was largely averted by the firm and patriotic stand of Senator Lodge and other Republican leaders, aided by a few patriotic Democrats." He criticized the Republican party as "the American party, free from the corroding touch of European domination," and disapproved the Democrats as having become an international party, favoring the interests of other countries at the expense of America.
