## EDITORIAL

### CIMARRON ITSELF AGAIN

With the coming of the financial panic the whole West was hit and hit hard. Improvements stopped. Development was at a standstill, but little Cimarron was among the last to be really injured by the effect of the depression. But even in the worst of those bad times, Cimarron held its own. There was, it is true, a decrease in building, but it was noticed by all visitors that some buildings were being erected at all times. Now that the financial prospect in the country at large seems brighter, money has loosened up and we have taken a fresh start. A \$100,000 school house will be erected at once and the contractor is now hauling materials on to the grounds. A two story stone building has been begun on Tenth street, south of the depot. Residences and other improvements are building. The saw and lumber mills are working at full blast, the box factory of the Continental Tie & Timber Co. is working a night and day shift; the brick yard is working overtime; the McCormick Irrigation project is well under way; mining experts and capitalists have been investigating Cimarron's mineral deposits; a smelter has been promised us, and land-lookers are visiting us every day. Well, does this look good to you? Is Cimarron a dead one?

### TRADE EXTENSION.

In the columns of the Citizen has appeared two articles on trade extension for Cimarron. It has heartily endorsed the actions of a few of the merchants of Cimarron in endeavoring to have a road opened up between here and Miami. These men deserve all credit and they should be helped in every possible manner in this enterprise. The Citizen is especially pleased at the interest the few have taken in this matter, not only because of the ultimate good to be derived by Cimarron by this action, but also because it shows that our merchants are alert, up and doing set of men.

Without such men, no town can prosper and grow even though its position and natural resources are sufficient to support tens of thousands.

But while the Citizen is congratulating the merchants, it has this fact to find—and it is a serious one: NOT ALL THE MERCHANTS AND BUSINESS MEN are giving the movement active support. There is too much of a spirit of among a few to nod their heads and say that it will be a fine thing—and then let it go at that. It is an easy matter to say "Sure! It's a fine thing, old man. Go ahead. It ought to be done." But help of this sort is not needed. Show us the merchant or business man who says "Show me what to do and I'll do it" and we will show you the progressive, the winner and the man that will ultimately distance the fellow who is willing to take a good thing if it is handed to him but is too penurious to pitch in and help. The Citizen does not accuse the laggards or those who have taken no interest in the Miami Road of being this sort of men—but it has its suspicions.

Listen to this. The Miami people say that they can save about twenty-five per cent by purchasing in Cimarron. Think of that. Cimarron can meet Springer prices and beat them by one-fourth and still make a profit. With the road opened up which will save the Miami buyer from five to seven miles, and twenty-five per cent on his money, where will he go? To Springer? Well, hardly. The survey of the road has been made by the Townsite engineer, whose services have been donated, and he reports that a fine road can be built with but comparatively low cost. Now it is up to you, business men and merchants. Are you willing to help? If so, communicate with Mr. Norman Wilkins or Mr. Frederic Whitney and get organized. Now is the time.

### IRRIGATION CONGRESS.

We people of Colfax county must not allow ourselves to forget that ours is the banner county if the Territory and as such is expected to

have the largest, the best and most extensive exhibit at the Irrigation Congress at Albuquerque, which will be held next month.

Those in charge of the county exhibit have been working unceasingly to gather together the best that Colfax county produces, in whatever line of shape the exhibits may be. And already a mammoth display has been collected. Nothing has been forgotten, and the wonderful minerals of Colfax county are already shown in all their glory by entries made. Every sort of ores will be shown, as well as coal, industrial and manufactured articles will be displayed in a most suitable manner. The school exhibits are superb, and taking it all in all, the exhibit already collected and arranged for, is a glorious one. But there is still room for improvement in every line, and the wish is expressed by those in charge, for more material.

Colfax county is erecting a fine display building, and as far as is known is the only county to have its own structure in which to house its exhibit. The building, now near completion, is extremely well adapted to its purpose. Why not fill it to overflowing.

As yet the agricultural display is far from complete. This, of course, is natural, because the harvest season is hardly at hand. But the committee want the agricultural and stock display to eclipse all others. While Colfax county has magnificent natural resources other than those agricultural, still as a farming and stockraising country, it excels. The object of the display is to show the world at large what we have, and to especially convince the farmer that the surpassingly rich lands of Colfax county will raise anything in the crop, produce and stock line.

So you fruit raisers, you stock raisers, you ranchers, you farmers and you truck gardeners, make your best effort and enter your best as an exhibit. The committee in charge are prepared to take care of your exhibits in the best possible manner, and a square deal is guaranteed to every one.

### WHICH?

Andrews or Larrazola? A married and found competent, or a man who has never done acts worthy of warranting the voters of New Mexico to try him, and find him wanting? A silent worker or a loquacious critic of National and Territorial administrations without an idea of how to remedy the alleged defects. From all that the Citizen can gather, Mr. Larrazola's chief stock of trade in the campaign he is making is a few set and well rehearsed speeches, in which he attacks everything republican from our highest executive, President Roosevelt down. He points out alleged evils in republican officials and policies, charges even our exalted President with bad faith, and then fails to produce the proof. He asserts that President Roosevelt is secretly opposed to the admission of New Mexico as a state, and this, too, in the teeth of the President's public announcement to the contrary. Mr. Larrazola is conducting a campaign which drags down. Not a word as to how conditions can be bettered. He says in effect, elect me, and everything will be all right, but he fails to tell how he will make things right. In fact the feature of the man can be gauged by the nonsense of his speeches.
